AVID develops intentional readiness by exposing students to rigorous instruction and supporting them in exploring, preparing for, and navigating their chosen postsecondary pathways.

9 out of 10

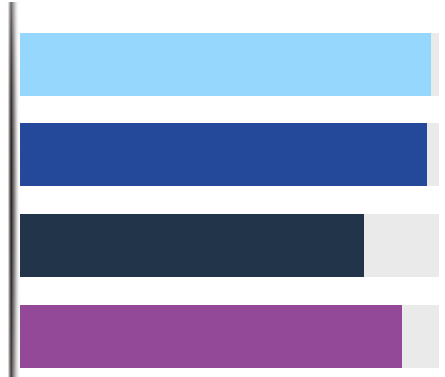
AVID seniors in Idaho were college- and career-ready.

98% took at least one course of rigor.

97% completed the 4 years of rigorous coursework necessary for college admission.

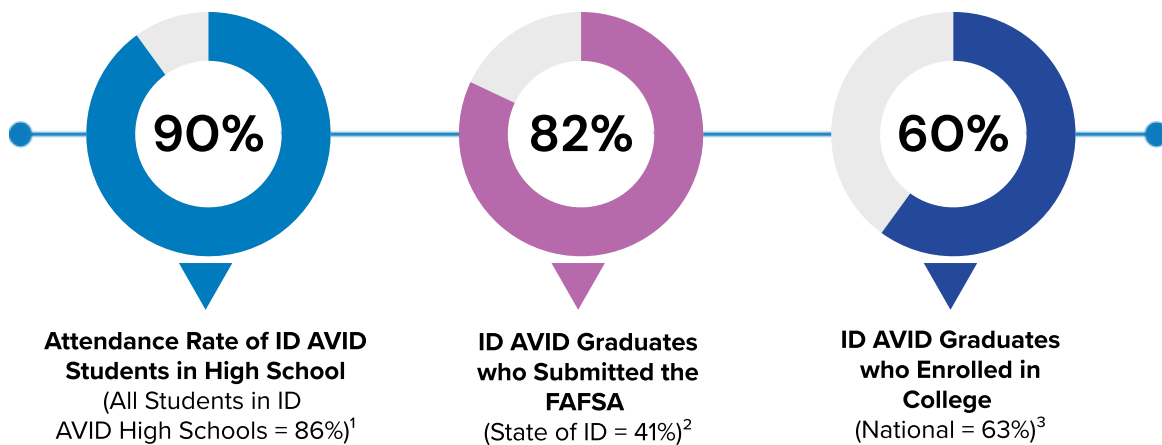
82% submitted the FAFSA.

91% planned to attend either a 2- or 4-year college.



How Does This Happen?

AVID trains educators in inquiry-based instruction that develops student agency, academic success and critical thinking skills, and the ability to engage and collaborate with others.



Relational Capacity Helps Students and Teachers

AVID-trained educators develop relational capacity among staff and students by ensuring that connections and interactions are built on **respect, trust, and authenticity**, creating a foundation for positive relationships and a sense of belonging that enhances engagement and productivity in learning environments.

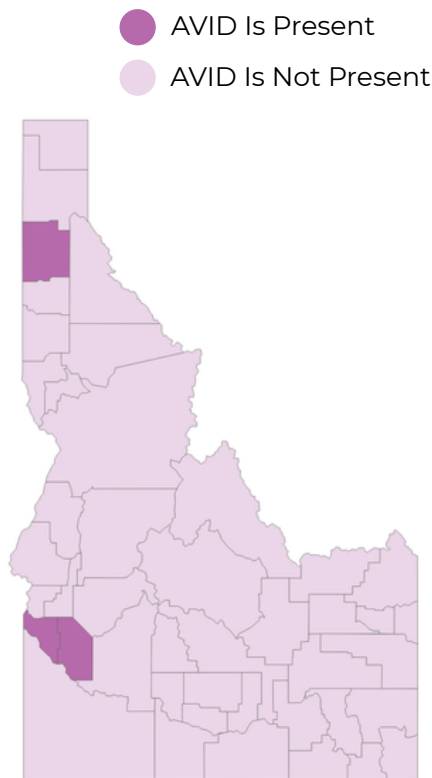
AVID-Trained Teachers Have Higher Rates of Retention

Data from OR and AZ illustrate that schools retain AVID-trained teachers **at rates 4 to 9 percentage points higher**⁴ than teachers who were not AVID-trained.

AVID Students Have Higher Attendance Rates

Years of data illustrate that AVID students have **attendance rates that are 1 to 2 percentage points higher**⁵, on average, than schools' overall rates.
