### **ELECTRIC AIRPORT**

THE world's first airport for electric aircraft is being built in Coventry in the UK.


Air-One will launch later this year and become the hub for electric vehicles, including flying cars (eVTOLs), air taxis and delivery drones.

The project is being run by urban-Air Port, after it won the Government's Future Flight Challenge. The aim of the challenge was to develop greener ways to fly. It's hoped this new airport will be able to tackle both congestion and air pollution.

#### NEW research suggests that all modern-day pet dogs originated from wolves in Ice Age Siberia!

Scientists from Europe and the US looked at DNA samples and archaeological evidence. They believe that during the last Ice Age, wolves were forced to rely on human camps for scraps of food, since their usual prev of creatures like reindeer and bison was in decline.

Humans and dogs crossed from Siberia into the Americas on a strip of land that is now covered by the waters of the Bering Strait.



TWELVE-YEAR-OLD Auldin Maxwell, from British Columbia, Canada, has set a Guinness World Record for the most Jenga blocks stacked on top of one vertical block.

Auldin successfully stacked a whopping 693 Jenga blocks atop one block, beating the previous record of 485, set last year.
