FINLAND has been named the happiest country in the world for the fourth time in a row!

In this year's World Happiness Report, Denmark is in second place and Switzerland is in third. The UK has dropped down the list from 13th place to 17th. Mental health linked to the coronavirus pandemic is thought to be behind the fall. Afghanistan came in as the most unhappy country.

OVERSEAS fans will be banned from this year's Tokyo Olympics and Paralympics, due to the ongoing coronavirus pandemic.

Organisers made the announcement last week. The Games were postponed last year for the first time in their history, with the Olympics now due to begin on 23 July and finish on 8 August, and the Paralympics running from 24 August to 5 September.

Before the pandemic, there was huge demand from Japanese people for tickets. Now, polls show most think the Games should not be held at all this year.
