## A BOTTLENOSE dolphin has adopted a baby pilot whale in New Zealand.

Researcher Jochen Zaeschmar said that while it's not strange for dolphins to adopt the calves of another species, "it's quite unusual for them to adopt a species that's bigger than them". Bottlenose dolphins are no small fry, weighing up to 300kg, but that's nothing compared to a pilot whale. These ocean giants can weigh two tonnes and grow to be six metres long.
