

#### TWO gold medals were awarded in the men's high jump at Tokyo 2020.

Qatar's Mutaz Essa Barshim and Italy's Gianmarco Tamberi were tied on 2.37 metres. When a jump-off was suggested to settle the contest, Barshim asked if they could have two gold medals instead and it was agreed that they could!

TWIN Sumatran tigers were born at the

Taman Safari Bogor theme park in Indonesia. The Sumatran tiger is listed as critically endangered, with only 400 estimated to live in the wild.



RESEARCHERS have said that enough ice melted in one day to cover Florida in two inches (5cm) of water.

The melting ice was from an ice sheet in Greenland. Data from the Danish government showed that on Tuesday 27 July the ice sheet lost 8.5bn tonnes of surface mass. Two days later, 8.4bn tonnes of ice loss was recorded.

Marco Tedesco, a glacier expert at Columbia University, said: "It's a very high level of melting and it will probably change the face of Greenland, because it will be a very strong driver for an acceleration of future melting, and therefore sea level rise."
