SoCon Championship

ASHEVILLE, N.C.--Top seed Chattanooga (28-4), winners of 17 of its last 18 games, claimed the Ingles Southern Conference Women's Basketball Championship Tournament championship for a second straight year and punched its ticket to the NCAA tourney with a hard-fought 69-60 victory over No. 2 seed UNC Greensboro Sunday at Harrah's Cherokee Center in Asheville, N.C.

All-League First Team selections Jada Guinn (19.3 ppg) and Raven Thompson (14.3 ppg), the No. 2 and 4 scorers in the Southern Conference, respectively, did not disappoint in combining for 46 points for the Mocs.

Guinn scored 24 of her game-high 32 points in the second half and was named the tournament's Most Outstanding Player. She averaged 27.0 points in her three tournament games to lead all players. She made 13 of 23 field goal attempts against UNC Greensboro, marking the 31st time in 32 games she has reached double figures in scoring this year. Thompson poured in eight of her 14 points in the second quarter to lift Chattanooga into a 32-29 lead at halftime.

Freshman Hannah Kohn continued her threepoint mastery with three shots made in three attempts beyond the arc..

UNC Greensboro kept the game close until the waning minutes. Ayanna Khalfani, who was named the SoCon Defensive Player of the Year, scored 15 points to lead the Spartans, while Isis Grady tallied 12 and Nia Howard added nine.

Trailing 5-3 early, UNC Greensboro reeled off seven unanswered points and secured a 12-10 lead at the end of the first quarter. Howard, a 5-8 junior guard who entered the game averaging 5.9 points, scored seven of the Spartans' 12 points in the first period.

Chattanooga's defense, which led the Southern Conference (54.3 ppg) and ranked eighth nationally this season, stifled a UNCG offense that made only 36.5 percent (19-of-52) of its field goal tries.

The Mocs never trailed in the second half. Their largest lead of the game was nine points at 62-53 with 5:16 left and the final score.

Notes

- Chattanooga currently stands at 28-4 after finishing with a 13-1 record in the conference
- •The Mocs came into the tournament as the No.1 seed for the 18th time in program history (23rd regular season title) and won their 20th Tournament Championship

•Chattanooga is now 20-0 in the title game

- The 14th-seeded Mocs will face third-seeded N.C. State in the Portland 4 Regional in the first round on March 23rd at 2:30 p.m., in Raleigh, North Carolina
- This season, the Mocs are undefeated in true road games joining South Carolina as the only undefeated road teams. They are currently sixth in the NCAA in scoring defense (54.0 ppg), 14th in three points percentage (37.2), and 25th in free throw percentage (.771)
- The UNC Greensboro women's basketball team has been selected as an automatic qualifier to compete in the 2024 Postseason WNIT, sponsored by Triple Crown. The WNIT announced Monday that the Spartans will play their first-round game on the road at North Carolina A&T on Friday, March 22 at 7 p.m. in Corbett Sports Center in Greensboro, N.C.
- Jada Guinn and Raven Thompson were both names First Team All-Conference, while Sigrun Olafsdottir and Hannah Kohn received All-Defensive and All-Freshman team honors, respectively
- •Head Coach Shawn Poppie was named SoCon Coach of the Year in just his second season
- •Wofford guard Rachael Rose was voted player of the year, for the second consecutive season, by the league's coaches. Rose leads the conference in six categories including points per game (22.1), rebounding (8.6) free throw percentage (.875), assists per game (5.6), assist-to-turnover ratio (2.3) and steals per game (2.1).
- UNCG's Ayanna Khalfani was voted defensive player of the year and second team all-conference. She is just the second Spartan to be named defensive player of the year, the first was Monique Floyd in 2008-09.
- Kennedy Langham is Samford's third freshman of the year, the last one being Sussy Ngulefac in 2021-22.
- Evangelia Paulk the third freshman of the year winner for Wofford, the first since Lilly Hatton in 2019-20.
- Shawn Poppie is the eleventh coach of the Mocs to be named coach of the year and the first since 2014-15, when Jim Foster received the honor.
- The coaches and media had the same five players on their respective first teams. The groups had four players in common on the second teams, with the coaches choosing Western Carolina's Lonasia Brewer and the media including Furman's Kate Johnson
- Furman guard Tate Walters returned the court after missing most of the 2022-23 season and was named the Ann Lashley Inspiration Award recipient.
- Mercer's Summah Evans was named to the all -defensive team and the second team all-conference.

SoCon History

The SoCon is celebrating its 102nd anniversary in 2023. The fifth-oldest NCAA Division I college athletic association, the SoCon contested the firstever collegiate conference basketball tournament in 1921, tackled freshman eligibility in 1922, became the first conference to adopt the 3-point field goal in basketball in 1980 and developed women's championships in 1984.



SOCON CHAMPIONSHIP

The Southern Conference Basketball Championships will be held March 7-10. The women's tournament will be held March 7-9, with the men's tournament slated for March 8-10, all at the Harrah's Cherokee Center - Asheville, in Asheville, North Carolina. The tournament will include all eight women's teams and all 10 men's teams.

2024 ALL-SOCON WOMEN'S BASKETBALL TEAMS

SPARTANBURG, S.C. – The Southern Conference announced the 2023-24 women's basketball postseason awards Tuesday. Selections include the coaches' all-conference teams and specialty awards in addition to the Southern Conference Sports Media Association all-conference teams and awards.

Wofford's Rachael Rose was tabbed player of the year by the coaches and the media. Samford's Kennedy Langham was voted freshman of the year by the coaches, while Wofford's Evangelia Paulk was named freshman of the year by the media. Chattanooga second-year head coach Shawn Poppie was voted coach of the year by both the coaches and the media

UNCG guard Ayanna Khalfani was named defensive player of the year by the coaches and Furman's Tate Walters was the winner of the Ann Lashley Inspiration Award.

The 2024 Ingles Southern Conference Women's Basketball Championship begins Thursday at 11 a.m. at the Harrah's Cherokee Center – Asheville in Asheville, North Carolina. The championship game is scheduled for Sunday at noon ET and will be televised on ESPNU.

Notes

- Rachael Rose won the coaches poll Player of the Year a season ago. She is the first player to win consecutive Player of the Year awards since Mercer's Kahlia Lawrence (2015-18). Rose is one of two Terriers to win this award, the only to win it multiple times.
- Kennedy Langham is Samford's third freshman of the year, the last one being Sussy Ngulefac in 2021-22.
- Evangelia Paulk the third freshman of the year winner for Wofford, the first since Lilly Hatton in 2019-20.
- Ayanna Khalfani is just the second Spartan to be named defensive player of the year, the first was Monique Floyd in 2008-09.
- Shawn Poppie is the eleventh coach of the Mocs to be named coach of the year and the first since 2014-15, when Jim Foster received the honor.
- The coaches and media had the same five players on their respective first teams. The groups had four players in common on the second teams, with the coaches choosing Western Carolina's Lonasia Brewer and the media including Furman's Kate Johnson
