The SoCon will enjoy airtime on CSTV on Saturday as Furman hosts Jacksonville State at 1:30 p.m. to open the 2006 season. Jonathan Coachman will provide play-by-play action with Chris Rix as the analyst.



## Two-Minute Drill

- Appalachian State picked up its first-ever national championship in 2005, defeating UNI 21-16 in the title game. The Mountaineers tied a school-record with 12 wins last season.
- The SoCon slipped past the Big Sky in 2005 for most national titles with its sixth. The Big Sky has five, its last in 2001.
- Two new head coaches will stroll the sidelines this fall. Pete Lembo will lead Elon this season, joining the Phoenix from Lehigh. Brian VanGorder takes over at Georgia Southern after serving as the linebackers coach with the Jacksonville Jaguars in 2005.
- Seven of the top 10 rushers from 2005 return this season. Georgia Southern's Jayson Foster is the lead returning rusher, compiling 1,481 rushing yards last season. ASU's Kevin Richardson also returns after scoring 19 touchdowns and picking up 1,433 yards on the ground. Chattanooga's Eldra Buckley set a school record with 1,233 rushing yards in 2005 and will look to add to that this season.
- Twenty-four all-conference selections from 2005 return this season. Appalachian State returns eight, including six from the first team, followed by Chattanooga and Furman, each with four. Wesern Carolina has three all-league picks returning, with Georgia Southern bringing back two. Elon and The Citadel also have one each coming back for the 2006 season



## ASU...National Champions!

Appalachian State 21, UNI 16

A-S-U! It was all that was heard throughout Chattanooga on December 15. The fans made their presence known after Appalachian State won its first-ever national title with a 21-16 victory of UNI.

A tenacious defense and teamwork led to a national championship for the Mountaineers. Quarterback Trey Elder started for Appalachian State, registering 123 yards of offense in the first half. But coming out of the locker room, he turned the lead reigns over to Player of the Year Richie Williams, who was battling an ankle injury. Williams came in and threw for 129 yards.

But it was the defense that sealed the win for ASU. Despite Kevin Richardson's second touchdown of the game midway through the third quarter, ASU continued to trail until less 10 minutes remained in the ballgame, when Marques Murrell and Jason Hunter elevated their play to another level.

Wreaking havoc in the backfield like they did for much of the evening, Murrell sacked Panther quarterback Eric Sanders on the UNI 15 to force a fumble that Hunter scooped up and carried to to the endzone for his third touchdown of the season, giving the Mountaineers the 21-16 lead. Neither team scored in the final nine minutes, and the defense caused more turnovers to give ASU the title.

Western Carolina (5-4 in 2005) boasts a potent aerial attack led by senior quarter-back Justin Clark (1,253 yards passing) and receivers J.C. Brown (28 receptions for 374 yards), a senior, and junior Michael Hines (27 catches for 368 yards). Defensively, senior safety Mitchell Dukes registered seven sacks in 2005, second most in the Southern Conference. The stingy Catamount defense yielded just 132.3 yards per game through the air, ranking them No. 1 nationally. In addition, Western Carolina allowed 19.8 points per game, second best in the Southern Conference. Chowan (2-8 last year) played at the Division III level before moving to Division II last season. The Catamounts were 4-1 at E.J. Whitmire Stadium last season.

Two state rivals face off in the 2006 season-opener. Chattanooga (6-5 last season) recorded a 30-23 overtime win over Tennessee Tech (4-7 in 2005) a year ago. Jinior quarterback Antonio Miller passed for 1,234 yards last season for the Mocs, completing 59.9 percent of his passes. His favorite target, senior wide receiver Emanuel Hassell, caught 52 passes for 548 yards in 2005. Tennessee Tech assistant coach Doug Malone was promoted to head coach on July 14, 2006 after Mike Hennigan requested a medical leave of absence. Golden Eagle receivers Brent McNeal and Larry Shipp have caught passes in 22 and 21 consecutive games, respectively. The two teams have played 25 of the 37 games of the series in Chattanooga. The game will be televised locally on WCTE-TV.

Defending I-AA National Champion Appalachian State (12-3 in 2005) takes on ACC foe North Carolina St. (7-5) in the season-opener for both teams. The team's last met in 1992 with the Wolfpack winning 35-10. The Mountaineers bring a six-game winning streak into the contest and are led by junior running back Kevin Richardson (1,433 yards rushing and 19 TDs in 2005) and senior defensive end Marques Murrell (82 tackles a year ago). Both are listed on the initial 16-player 2006 Walter Payton and Buck Buchanan watch lists, respectively. Appalachian State led the Southern Conference in scoring (30.3 ppg) last season. All games in the series, which dates back to 1932, have been played in Raleigh, N.C.

Texas A&M (5-6 in 2005) hosts The Citadel (4-7 a year ago) in the first meeting between the two teams. The Aggies lost their last four contests a year ago while the Bulldogs closed out the 2005 campaign with back-to-back wins. Eighteen starters return for the Bulldogs including senior defensive ends James Wilson and Deon Douglas, who recorded four sacks each a year ago. The Bulldogs boasted the Southern Conference's top rushing defense in 2005, allowing 155.1 ypg. Offensively, The Citadel is led by senior running back Nuru Goodrum, who rushed for 800 yards in 10 games in 2005. In addition to Texas A&M, Citadel plays at Pittsburgh this season. A year ago, the Bulldogs played both Florida St. and Mississippi.

No. 25-ranked Coastal Carolina (9-2 a year ago) hosts Elon (3-8) in a non-conference tilt. The game will mark the beginning of the Pete Lembo Era at Elon. Lembo, in his first season at the helm, came to Elon after posting a 44-14 record in five seasons at Lehigh. On offense, the Phoenix are led by junior running back Reggie Hall, who rushed for 796 yards, fifth best in the Southern Conference in 2005, and junior wide receiver Michael Mayers, who caught 41 passes for 632 yards and four scores in 2005. On defense, senior linebacker Chad Nkang was among the conference leaders in both sacks (3 unassisted and 2 assisted) and tackles for loss (14 unassisted and 9 assisted). Coastal Carolina won the 2005 match-up by a 17-10 score and earned a share of the Big South title.

The contest is a rematch of last year's season-opener in which Furman (11-3 in 2005) posted a 37-35 triumph over Jacksonville St. (6-5 last year) when the Paladins scored the game-winning touchdown on the final play of the game. Last year, the Paladins led the Southern Conference in total offense (470.0 ypg) and finished second in scoring (34.9 ppg). Junior fullback Jerome Felton, who rushed for 940 yards and 18 TDs in 2005, was named to The Sports Network's Preseason All-America team. Senior defensive end Roy Ravenell earned Honorable Mention recognition after recording 71 tackles a year ago. Furman was 7-0 at Paladin Stadium last season outscoring the opponents by a 264-165 margin. The game will be televised by CSTV.

Wofford (6-5 last year) has won the last four meetings with South Carolina St. (9-2 last season) including a 24-22 decision in 2004 in Orangeburg, S.C. Although the Terriers have held the upper hand in recent years, two of the last three meetings were decided by two points or fewer. The 11,486 fans on hand for the 2003 meeting marks the second largest attendance in Gibbs Stadium history. Wofford averaged 283.4 yards per game on the ground last season, ranking them fourth nationally. Junior running back Kevious Johnson, who missed last season after rushing for 1,035 yards with nine touchdowns in 2004, returns to bolster the Wofford running attack. The Bulldogs allowed just 13.9 points per game and 129.2 yards per contest on the ground in 2005.

#### Appalachian State (0-0)

Appalachian State enters the 2006 season as the defending National Champion ... The Mountaineers return 56 letterwinners, 16 starters, seven all-conference selections and five All-Americans under head coach Jerry Moore ... Moore enters his 18<sup>th</sup> year at ASU with 97 conference wins and 140 career wins...He is tied for seventh among the

and 140 career wins...He is tied for seventh among the winningest active I-AA coaches...Moore is three shy of becoming the first SoCon coach to reach 100 league wins and should he pick up 10 wins this season, would be the first coach in league annals to win 150 games...ASU's Trey Elder will make the calls as the starting quarterback...Elder started the National Championship game in 2005 in place of an injured Richie Williams...Appalachian State is the top-ranked team in the country according to *The Sports Network* preseason poll...The Mountaineers open the season at North Carolina State...The last time the teams met was in 1992 with the Wolfpack winning 35-10



#### Chattanooga (0-0)

Chattanooga opens the 2006 season at Tennessee Tech on Thursday...The Mocs lead the series 27-10, including a 30-23 overtime win last season...Chattanooga also holds an 8-4 advantage when playing in Cookeville...UTC posted its first winning season since 1997 last year with a 6-5 record...Head coach Rodney Allison welcomed six new coaches to his staff this season...Eight Mocs

were tabbed preseason all-league selections, including 2005 All-SoCon honoree Eldra Buckley...Buckley returns as one of the top rushers in the league, finishing third last season behind GSU's Jermaine Austin and Jayson Foster...Buckley tallied 1,233 rushing yards in 2005 and was third in the conference averaging 124.5 all-purpose yards.



#### The Citadel (0-0)

The Citadel heads to College Station, Texas, to kick off the 2006 season ... This marks the first time the Bulldogs have faced a team from Texas and the Big 12...The last time The Citadel opened its season with a I-A opponent was 2002 when the Bulldogs went to LSU...Three Bulldogs were named to the preseason all-league second team...Junior WR Ta'Mar Jernigan, LB Andrew Rowell and senior DL James Wilson all received the honor...Junior QB Duran Lawson returns as the play caller after a season-ending injury side-

lined him with seven games left last year...There will be a new look at Hagood Stadium this season as the west stands are reopened on September 9 for the Charleston Southern game...The stands were completed for the 2006 season but the project, which includes luxury suites, club seats, a new press box and other amenities and facilities, is scheduled to be completed in 2008.



#### Elon (0-0)

Elon heads into 2006 with a new look on the sideline...Head coach Pete Lembo will make his Phoenix coaching debut at Coastal Carolina this Saturday...Lembo joined the staff from Lehigh where he coached for five years with a 44-14 record...The Phoenical Carolina and Carolina and

he coached for five years with a 44-14 record...The Phoenix return All-American Chad Nkang on defense...Nkang led the nation in tackles last season and has been tabbed the SoCon Preseason Defensive Player of the Year...Junior Wes Pope will lead the Elon offense, moving from tight end to quarterback in 2006...As a redshirt freshman in 2004, Pope completed 31 of 60 passes for 268 yards in limited action at the quarterback position.



#### Furman (0-0)

Furman opens the 2006 season at home against Jacksonville State this Saturday on CSTV...It marks the second straight season that the two teams have squared off to open the year...Furman is coming off an 11-3 campaign that included a 5-2 conference record and an appearance in the NCAA I-AA playoff semifinals...The Paladins have 11 players selected for preseason All-SoCon honors, including Jerome

Felton, who is also on the Peyton Award watch list...The 2006 season marks the 101st season of football at Furman...The Paladins were one of the first two schools in South Carolina to play football, along with Wofford...Furman is ranked fifth by *The Sporting News* entering the season and return 14 starters off last year's squad...The Paladins boast the best record (56-21, 727) among NCAA Division I-AA and I-AA programs in the Carolinas this decade...Appalachian State is second (52-24, .684) and Wofford third (46-24, .657)...True freshman Max Lerner is redshirting this season, but is starring off the field...Lerner is a cast member of MTV's "Two-A-Day's: Hoover High", which premiered August 23...The series shows Lerner and several of his former teammates in depth from the start of their 2005 campaign to the conclusion of a 14-1, Alabama 6A state championship season.



### Georgia Southern (0-0)

The Eagles will get one more week of practice under their belt before opening the season hosting Central Connecticut State on September 9...Georgia Southern first year head coach Brian VanGorder brings experience and knowledge to the sidelines...VanGorder joined the staff

after spending the 2005 season with the Jacksonville Jaguars...He served five years as the defensive coordinator for Georgia before moving to Jacksonville...All 10 of his assistant coaches are also new to the program...The Eagles are coming off their 23<sup>rd</sup> winning season in 24 years with an 8-4 record in 2005...Two all-conference selections return from last years squad in LB John Mohring and DL Charrod Taylor...Both were named 2006 preseason all-league selections and will anchor the defense...Jayson Foster, who is the returning rusher from 2005, is moving from quarterback to wide receiver in the new offense, opening the door for Travis Clark, a transfer from Southern Mississippi, and redshirt freshman Zach Stanford, who entered fall practice as the Eagles' starter...GSU will play seven home games this season, including four on television.



#### Western Carolina (0-0)

Western Carolina will open its 2006 season on Thursday night hosting Chowan...This will mark the first meeting between the two schools... WCU has won eight straight home openers, 12 of the last 13 and are 22-9 all-time in its first home game of the season...It will be a homecoming for Chowan assistant coach Jim Garrison,
