# **Southern Conference Notes**



New Face In 2005: The fraternity of Southern Conference head coaches experienced little change following the 2004 season. There was one head coaching change as The Citadel hired Kevin Higgins to replace John Zernhelt who left the Bulldogs to become an assistant coach with the New York Jets of the NFL. Higgins joined The Citadel from the Detroit Lions but previously was the head coach at Lehigh where he led the Mountain Hawks to playoff appearances in each of his last three seasons from 1998-2000.

Service Academies have SoCon flavor: The head coach at each of the three national service academies has strong ties to the Southern Conference. Navy's Paul Johnson is a graduate of Western Carolina University and was the head coach at Georgia Southern from 1997-2001, leading the Eagles to back to back national championships in '99 and 2000. Army head coach Bobby Ross played in the SoCon at VMI before becoming the head coach at The Citadel from 1973-77. Air Force head coach Fisher DeBerry is a graduate of SoCon member Wofford College and spent 10 seasons as an assistant coach at Appalachian State

58 Percent of Starters Returning: The eight Southern Conference schools will return 58 percent of their starters for the 2005 season. Appalachian State, The Citadel and Elon will each return a total of 15 starters on offense and defense (not including specialists). The Citadel returns a league-high eight offensive starters while Appalachian's nine defensive starters returning is a league-best. Wofford has 13 returning starters followed by Western Carolina and Furman with 12 each, and 11 for Georgia Southern. Chattanooga has the fewest returning starters with nine.

Academics First: For the fifth consecutive year, the Southern Conference leads all District III conferences in the number of selections to the CoSIDA Academic All-District football team. The Academic All-District team is selected by members of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). District III includes Division I -A and I-AA teams in Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Virginia. Seven Southern Conference studentathletes earned mention on the 2004 All-District team. The Atlantic Coast Conference had the second-most selections with five student-athletes on the team. In 2003, the SoCon led all District III conferences with eight selections while seven student-athletes were honored in 2002. The So-Con had 10 representatives on the team in both 2001 and in 2000. The seven SoCon studentathletes honored in 2004 include Katon Bethay, Matt Beavin, Shane Fast, Josh Smith, Jonathan Wheeler and Ben Whitney of Wofford, and Elon's

Brandon Mason. To be eligible for the Academic All-District team, football players must carry a 3.2 cumulative grade-point average or higher, have reached sophomore academic and eligibility status and have played in 50 percent of their team's games.

National Rushing Leaders: Georgia Southern led the nation in rushing in 2004 with an average of 369.9 yards per game. That marked the fourth straight season that the Eagles won the national rushing crown. In fact, Southern Conference teams have led the country in rushing yardage six times in the last 11 seasons. Before GSU's current streak, the Eagles wore the rushing crown in 1999 while The Citadel was the top running team in 1994. The Citadel also led Division I-AA in rushing in 1992.

Spectacular Offensive Performance: One of the greatest offensive games in SoCon history took place on Oct. 30, 2004 at Finley Stadium in Chattanooga. The Mocs defeated Appalachian State 59-56 in a game that saw numerous school and conference records set. The 115 points were the second-most ever scored in a SoCon game. Appalachian set a SoCon record for the most points scored in a loss. Quarterback Cedric Stevens of Chattanooga threw for 515 yards while ASU's Richie Williams threw for 410. The 925 yards passing by the two OBs exceeded the previous SoCon record of 898 vards. Stevens' 515 yards through the air were the second-most by a SoCon QB while Williams tied a SoCon record by throwing for three TDs in the fourth quarter. Stevens' 570 yards of total offense set a SoCon record while Williams' 517 yards were the thirdmost in the conference. The two teams combined for an NCAA record 16 touchdowns in the contest. The game lasted 3:40 and included 1,337 total offense yards and 115 total points.

#### Appalalchian State's DaVon Fowlkes, Consensus Offensive Player of the Year

Fowlkes had the most prolific season of any receiver in Southern Conference history in 2004. The senior from Appalachian State caught a conference record 103 passes for 1,618 yards and 14 touchdowns. He set school and conference records for receptions and receiving yards in a season as well as the most 200-yard receiving games in a season with three. Fowlkes also tied conference marks with seven 100-yard receiving games including three consecutive 100-yard receiving games.

#### Furman's William Freeman, Coaches Defensive Player of the Year

Freeman, who began last season as Furman's starter at outside linebacker, moved into the middle after an injury to Mike Killian. Freeman led the Paladins with 86 tackles, the third-highest total in the SoCon. The junior also recorded 4.5 sacks, the fifth-best total in the conference. Freeman is the first Paladin to earn defensive player of the year honors from the coaches since middle linebacker Will Bouton in 2000.

#### Jayson Foster, Coaches Freshman of the Year

Foster, a redshirt freshman quarterback, became a jack-of-all-trades for Georgia Southern last fall. He found five different ways to score as he rushed for four touchdowns, threw a 54-yard touchdown pass, caught two scoring tosses and also scored on a 94-yard punt return and an 83-yard kickoff return. Georgia Southern leads the SoCon with four all-time freshman of the year honorees. Foster is the first Eagle so honored since Jermaine Austin in 2002.

#### Ben Bainbridge, Jacobs Blocking Trophy

Bainbridge, a 6-6, 292-pound senior, anchored Furman's offensive line that averaged 226.2 yards rushing per game and produced the nation's seventh-best offensive unit at 454.9 yards per game. The Paladin offensive line allowed just nine regular season sacks, the fewest by a non-option offensive line in the SoCon. Bainbridge is the 12th Paladin to earn the Jacobs Blocking Trophy, the most of any SoCon institution.

#### Mike Sewak, Coaches Coach of the Year

Sewak, in his third season as Georgia Southern's head coach, led the Eagles to a 9-3 overall record and a regular season co-championship in 2004. He has compiled a 27-10 overall record and his 18-5 conference record (.783) is the best among active conference coaches. Paul Johnson was the last Georgia Southern head coach to earn coach of the year honors in 1998. GSU has had four coaches honored, the most of any SoCon school since the coaches award started in 1989.
