2006 BIG TEN BASEBALL TOURNAMENT

The University of Michigan will serve as host of the 2006 Big Ten Baseball Tournament after clinching the school's league-leading 33rd conference title and the first since 1997. The Wolverines will welcome Illinois, Minnesota, Northwestern, Ohio State and Purdue to Ray Fisher Stadium in Ann Arbor for the 26th annual event, which will be held Wednesday, May 24, through Saturday, May 27.

Big Ten champion Michigan earned the No. 1 seed by finishing with a conference mark of 23-9 and a school record for league wins. Northwestern will enter the conference tournament as the No. 2 seed at 21-11 in league play. Both Michigan and Northwestern earned first-round byes and will begin play on Thursday, May 25.

Ohio State (19-12 in conference action) claimed sole possession of third place and earned the No. 3 seed, while Minnesota (17-14) clinched the fourth seed for the post-season tournament.

Illinois and Purdue both finished tied for fifth at 15-17 in league play and their seeds were determined by a tiebreak. With the Illini and Boilermakers splitting their four-game series in April, the tiebreak was decided by compiling both teams' winning percentage over all Big Ten Tournament participants. Illinois was 9-11 (.450) against the other teams while Purdue, which played all tournament teams with exception of Minnesota, was 6-10 (.375), thus giving the Illini the fifth seed and the Boilermakers the sixth and final spot.

The 2006 Big Ten Tournament will open on Wednesday, May 24, as No. 4 Minnesota will battle No. 5 Illinois before No. 3 Ohio State takes on No. 6 Purdue. The top two seeds begin play on Thursday, May 25, as No. 2 Northwestern will face the highest-seeded winner from Wednesday and No. 1 Michigan will square off against the lowest-seeded winner from Wednesday. The tournament winner is granted the conference's automatic bid to the NCAA Championship.
