Michigan Claims Big Ten Women's Gymnastics Championship

Wolverines earn their fifth-consecutive title and 24th overall

CHAMPAIGN, ILL. - Michigan earned the 2018 Big Ten Women's Gymnastics Championships title on Saturday, securing its 24th overall and fifth-consecutive crown. With the title, Wolverine head coach Bev Plocki ties Indiana's James Councilman (men's swimming and diving) for the most Big Ten titles in conference history across all sports.

The Wolverines tallied 197.200 points en route to the team title, followed by Nebraska in second place with 196.950. Illinois finished in third with 196.625 points, Iowa placed fourth with 196.400, Ohio State earned fifth with 196.325, while Minnesota rounded out the top six with 196.225.

Nebraska's Megan Schwehofer earned the all-around title with a career-high 39.525, followed in second by Michigan's Paige Zaziski with a 39.500 and teammate Brianna Brown in third with a 39.450.

Nebraska's Taylor Houchin and Ohio State's Jamie Stone won the vault title, both with a score of 9.900. Michigan's Brianna Brown, Minnesota's Ivy Lu and Ohio State's Olivia Aepli each recorded a 9.950 to win on bars, while Illinois' Bridget Hodan, Michigan's Lauren Martinez and Nebraska's Grace Williams each tallied a 9.900 on beam to share the event title. Nebraska's Megan Schwehofer and Penn State's Briannah Tsang took home the floor title after posting a 9.950.

The conference's individual awards were also given out following the championships. Michigan's Paige Zaziski and Penn State's Briannah Tsang were named the Big Ten Co-Gymnasts of the Year, marking the 11th time a Wolverine has won the award and the eighth time a Nittany Lion claimed the honor. Minnesota's Lexy Ramler was tabbed the Big Ten Freshman of the Year, while Maryland head coach Brett Nelligan was named the Big Ten Coach of the Year for the first time in his career.

Fourteen students were named to the All-Championships Team. The complete list of the conference's All-Championships team and Sportsmanship Award honorees can be found below.

Michigan Claims Women's Gymnastics Regular Season Crown

Michigan clinches regular season title with win at Piscataway Big Five meet

ROSEMONT, Ill. - Michigan clinched the regular-season Big Ten Women's Gymnastics Championship on Saturday after finishing the season with an 8-1 Big Ten record. The Wolverines finished the conference schedule with a first-place finish at the Big Five Meet hosted by Rutgers, ending the event with a team score of 197.225. Michigan earns its second-straight conference title and fourth overall.

Illinois capped its regular season with a first-place finish at the Michigan State-hosted Big Five meet. The Illini were followed by Maryland (195.700), Ohio State (195.150), Nebraska (194.900) and Michigan State (192.825). The Wolverines concluded the Big Five Meet hosted by Rutgers with a 197.225 to win the competition, followed by Iowa with a score of 195.275. Minnesota concluded the event in third with a 195.150, followed by Penn State (194.375) and Rutgers (193.725).

In East Lansing, Illinois was paced by Rae Balthazor, who won titles on bars (9.925) and beam (9.900) en route to the all-around crown with a score of 39.525. Ohio State's Alexis Mattern claimed the vault title with a score of 9.925, while Michigan State's Hailee Westney and Balthazor tied for the bars title with a 9.925. Nebraska's Megan Schwehofer earned an event title on floor with a 9.950.

In Piscataway, Michigan used three event titles to finish at the top of the podium. On beam, Brianna Brown scored a 9.950 to earn the event title, while teammates Lexi Funk and Emma McLean recorded a 9.900 on floor to tie with Minnesota's Paige Williams for the individual title. Penn State's Lauren Bridgens finished at the top of the podium on vault (9.900), while Minnesota's Ivy Lu claimed the uneven bars crown with a score of 9.950. Minnesota's Lexy Ramler and the Wolverines' Funk tied for the all-around title, each posting a score of 39.450.

The 2018 Big Ten Women's Gymnastics Championships will be held Saturday, March 24, at State Farm Center on the campus of the University of Illinois. BTN will provide live coverage of Session One (3 p.m. ET) and Session Two (8 p.m. ET).

BIG FIVE MEETS

ROSEMONT, Ill. - The final weekend of the regular season will feature the annual Big Five Meets on Saturday, which will be hosted by Michigan State and Rutgers. Competition begins at 2 p.m. ET in East Lansing and 5:30 p.m. in Piscataway, with both Big Five meets carried live on BTN and also streamed live via the web, smartphones, tablets and connected devices on [BTN2Go](#).

Michigan State will play host to No. 11 Nebraska, No. 24 Ohio State, Illinois and Maryland, while Rutgers welcomes No. 7 Michigan, No. 22 Minnesota, No. 25 Penn State and Iowa.

The Big Five Meets are used to determine seeding at next week's Big Ten Women's Gymnastics Championships, which will be hosted by Illinois on Saturday, March 24. Listed below are the teams competing at each site, along with the rotation orders for both competitions.
