SECTION 1: OVERVIEW

These procedures outline the pathway for selection to the 2026 U21 National Team in KYORUGI.

The maximum team size can be 16 ATHLETES (8 MALE/8 FEMALE).

SECTION 2: ATHLETE REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Nationality/Passports Requirements:
 - Have a valid United States passport at the time of July 3rd, 2026 that does not expire for six months after the conclusion of the 2026 U.S. National Championships (July 4th to 8th, 2026).
- 2. WORLD TAEKWONDO (WT) Requirements:
 - Must be a citizen of the United States of America.
 - Holder of Taekwondo Dan certificate issued by the Kukkiwon
 - Must hold a valid 2026 WT Global Athlete License
 - Must be born between January 1, 2005 and December 31, 2009.
 Please note: this age range is based on the information established by WT for the 2025 U21 World Championships.
- 3. National Governing Body (NGB) Requirements:
 - Comply with the USATKD Athlete Agreement.
 - Comply with the USATKD Code of Ethics.
 - o Comply with the <u>USATKD SafeSport Policy</u>.
 - Athlete must be a USATKD member in good standing.
 - Athlete does not have an active suspension from the U.S. Center for SafeSport that would make the Athlete ineligible to participate as a member of the 2026 U21 National Team.
 - Athlete does not have an active sanction for an anti-doping rule/policy violation that would make the Athlete ineligible to participate as a member of the 2026 U21 National Team.
 - Athlete must compete in the World Class Black Belt division and hold a taekwondo Dan certificate issued by Kukkiwon or World Taekwondo (Article 4.1.3).

SECTION 3: OTHER MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR THE TEAM

- Meet the U.S. Center for SafeSport's education and training requirements in accordance with the <u>USOPC</u>
 <u>Athlete Safety Policy</u> if you will be 18 or older on the day after the Closing Ceremony.
 - Agree to be bound by and adhere to all WT, USATKD, WADA, USADA and USOPC anti-doping
 protocols, policies and procedures, as applicable. This includes participation in Out-of-Competition
 Testing and an agreement to be bound to the results management authority of WT, USAT, WADA,
 USADA, or other Anti-Doping Organization as applicable.

 Meet all health and safety protocols, to include vaccine requirements and/or testing requirements set forth by the government, local laws, USOPC, WT, USATKD and/or the Local Organizing Committee.

SECTION 5: SELECTION PROCESS

The 2026 U21 National Team will be determined by the winners of the U21 World Class black belt divisions at the 2026 U.S. National Championships (July 4th to 8th, 2026, Charlotte, NC). This team will represent USATKD at a TBD event in 2026.

5.2 EVALUATION EVENT QUALIFICATION PATHWAY:

Athletes can qualify for U21 divisions contested at the 2026 U.S. National Championships (July 4th to 8th, 2026, Charlotte, NC) via these pathways:

- 1. 2025 U.S. National Team members that competed at the 2025 World Taekwondo Championships (Oct. 24th-30th, 2025; Wuxi, China) that meet the age requirements found in Section 2 of this document.
 - A 2025 National Team member is eligible to automatically qualify for the U21 World Class Black Belt Division at the 2026 U.S. National Championships in the same weight category as their 2025 National Team Weight Division. If an athlete wants to contest a different weight category, they must qualify via route 3 listed below.

The 2025 World Championships Selection Procedures can be found here.

- 2. 2025 U21 U.S. National Team members that competed at the 2025 U21 World Taekwondo Championships (Dec. 3rd-6th, 2025; Nairobi, Kenya) that meet the age requirements found in Section 2 of this document.
 - A 2025 U21 National Team member is eligible to automatically qualify for the same U21 World Class Black Belt Division at the 2026 U.S. National Championships. If an athlete wants to contest a different weight category, they must requalify via route 3 listed below.

The 2025 U21 World Championships Selection Procedures can be found here.

- 3. Compete in the U21 division at one, or both, of the following open entry events:
 - a. 2026 U.S. Taekwondo American Open East (May 29th to 31st, 2026; Oaks, PA)
 - b. 2026 U.S. Taekwondo American Open West (June 12th to 14th, 2026; Tucson, AZ)
 *Both American Opens have no qualification requirements and are open entry.

5.3 NOMINATION TO THE TEAM:

1. The winners of each respective U21 World Class Black Belt weight division held at the 2026 U.S. National Championships will be nominated to the 2026 U21 National Team.

Please note: Competing in a U21 division at Nationals will meet the 2027 U.S. National Team Trials requirement for competing at 2026 U.S. Nationals. However, as this is a Team Trials, this division will not receive USAT Ranking points for the U21 divisions.

2026 U21 National Team Trials Format

1. The U21 World Class Black Belt categories will take place at the 2026 U.S. National Championships on.

If there are only 2 athletes in a division, then the division will follow a "Best of 3" competition system. If there are 3, or 4 athletes, then the division will follow a "Round Robin" competition system. If there are 5, or more, athletes in a division then the division follow a "Single Elimination Bracket" competition system.

Team Trials Seeding

Senior World Class Black Belt Divisions will be seeded via the following:

- 1. 2025 U.S. National Team Member
- 2. 2025 U21 U.S. National Team Member
- All other seeds beyond this list will be completed with USATKD Rankings.
- If there is no athlete qualified to fill a seed, the lower seeds will move up to the next highest seed.

SECTION 7: MANDATORY TRAINING AND/OR COMPETITION

There will be no mandatory training camps for the 2026 U21 National Team.

SECTION 8: DATE OF TEAM NOMINATION

NGB will nominate the Team following the conclusion of the 2026 U.S. National Championships (July 4th to 8th, 2026, Charlotte, NC)

SECTION 9: REMOVAL OF ATHLETES FROM THE TEAM

9.1 NGB JURISDICTION

- a. NGB has jurisdiction over the 2026 U21 National Team. An athlete who is nominated to the Team may be removed for any of the following reasons, as determined by NGB:
 - Voluntary withdrawal. Athlete submits a written letter to Eric Wininger, the USATKD Associate
 Director of National Teams requesting to voluntarily withdraw from the Team. Submissions must be
 sent to ewininger@usatkd.org.
 - ii. <u>Injury or illness</u>. A physician (or medical staff) approved by NGB provides certification that the Athlete has a debilitating condition. If Athlete refuses to provide verification of their illness or injury by a physician (or medical staff), their injury will be assumed to be debilitating, and they may be removed from the Team.
 - iii. <u>Failure to participate</u>. Athlete does not participate in all Mandatory Training and/or Competition as defined in these procedures.
 - iv. <u>Code of Conduct Violation.</u> Athlete violates the NGB Code of Conduct: https://www.usatkd.org/v2-resources/code-of-ethics
 - v. Athlete Agreement. Athlete violates a term in their signed NGB Athlete Agreement.
 - vi. <u>Non-compliance.</u> Athlete does not meet the athlete eligibility requirements listed in Section 2 and Section 3 of these selection procedures.
- b. An Athlete may be removed as a nominee to the Team or from the Team if found to have violated WADA, WT, USADA and/or USOPC anti-doping protocol, policies and procedures, the U.S. Center for SafeSport Code, the USOPC Athlete Safety Policy and the NGB SafeSport Policy, as applicable.

c. Non-compliance with the eligibility requirements listed in Section 2.4.

SECTION 10: SELECTION PROCESS IF ATHLETE VACANCY OCCURS PRIOR TO SUBMISSION OF ENTRIES BY NAME TO THE LOCAL ORGANIZING COMMITTEE

SECTION 11: RIGHT TO A HEARING

An athlete who is removed from the Team has the right to a hearing per the NGB's complaint procedures (<u>found here</u>) and the USOPC Bylaws (applies only for a Protected Competition), Section 9 (<u>https://www.usopc.org/governance/dispute-resolution</u>).

SECTION 12: REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

- USATKD Code of Ethics
- USATKD Athlete Agreement

SECTION 13: DISCLAIMERS

These procedures are based on WT rules and regulations as presently known and understood. Any change in the selection procedures caused by a change in WT rules and regulations will be distributed to the affected athletes immediately. The selection criteria are based on the latest information available to NGB.

However, the selection criteria are always subject to unforeseen, intervening circumstances, and realistically may not have accounted for every possible contingency. If any force of nature, pandemic, or force majeure, should cause the alteration or cancellation of any of the selection events listed in this document, these selection procedures may require revisions.

SECTION 14: CONFLICT OF INTEREST

All members of the Selection Committee (Section 6.3) and all individuals who developed these selection procedures (Section 21) must comply with the USATKD Conflict of Interest Policy, to include completing and submitting a disclosure form consistent with the USATKD Conflict of Interest Policy before convening the committee.

USATKD Conflict of Interest Policy

A conflict of interest exists when a personal, family, financial, professional, club, team or business relationship or interferes with, or maybe perceived to interfere with a committee member's ability to be impartial and participate in the selection process in a fair and impartial manner. Any member of the Selection Committee who has an actual, possible, or perceived conflict of interest must disclose it to the NGB's Ethics Committee prior to the start of the

selection process and may be required to recuse themself from the Selection Committee discussions and/or voting.

If a conflict exists, the NGB's Ethics Committee shall review the conflict and determine the committee member's level of involvement (e.g., whether that committee member must recuse themself from participating in discussions and/or voting).

During its review, the NGB Ethics Committee may ask a Selection Committee member or an affected person for more information at its discretion. For example, if a Selection Committee member is required to recuse themself from voting, the NGB Ethics Committee may still determine that a Selection Committee member who has relevant and necessary information related to athlete performance, such as a national team coach or high performance director, may, if requested by the Selection Committee, provide that information to the Selection Committee if the information is provided in a fair and unbiased manner and if the Selection Committee member with the conflict of interest does not vote toward the final decision.

Additionally, any person with a good faith belief that a committee member has a conflict of interest may report the alleged conflict of interest to the NGB Ethics Committee, smcnally@usatkd.org. Reports may also be made anonymously through the USOPC's Integrity Portal. No committee member shall retaliate in any way against a person who, in good faith, reports an alleged conflict of interest. In addition, the USOPC maintains a strict no retaliation policy that prohibits any employee, contractor, agent, volunteer, or member of the USOPC to take or threaten to take any action against an athlete for reporting information to or seeking assistance from the Office of the Athlete Ombuds.

Any recused individual shall be replaced in accordance with the NGB Selection Committee appointment process.

USATKD has a zero tolerance for retaliation against people who make good faith reports of potential ethical, policy, or legal violations, or who cooperate with investigations of those reports. That means no USOPC or NGB staff, Board or Committee member, or volunteer may threaten, harass, discriminate against, or take any negative employment or related action (e.g., discharge, demotion, suspension, negative review) on that basis.

APPENDIX B - GLOSSARY

Contingency means a future event or circumstance which is possible but cannot be predicted with certainty.

Force Majeure means an event or effect that cannot be reasonably anticipated or controlled (e.g., hurricane, tornado, etc.).

Grievance Procedures means the process that enables an athlete to file a complaint with the NGB or USOPC.

Jurisdiction means the power or authority to make decisions and judgments.

Nominated means an athlete, coach or staff member whose name has been submitted to the USOPC by an NGB for participation on the 2026 U21 National Team.

Protected Competition means a Delegation Event or a Qualifying Competition.

Qualifying Competition means either of the following:

- NGB Qualifying Competition: Any competition or activity organized or approved by the NGB where
 the athlete's performance or results are considered in the published selection criteria to represent the
 United States in a Delegation Event.
- ii. **International Qualifying Competition**: Any international sport competition where (i) athletes represent the United States against athletes representing other nations, (ii) the NGB officially designates entrants, as required by the competition organizers, and (iii) athlete results or performance are included in the published criteria to qualify, or be selected, to represent the United States in a Delegation Event.

Selected means an athlete, coach or staff member whose name has been submitted by the USOPC to the LOC at the final submission date, as determined by the LOC.
