TEAM USA WRESTLING OUTLOOK



2024 OLYMPIC GAMES • PARIS, FRANCE • AUGUST 5-11 • CHAMP DE MARS ARENA



The U.S. Olympic Wrestling Team, which will compete August 5-11 at Champ de Mars Arena in Paris, France, includes full six-athlete teams in men's freestyle and women's freestyle, plus four Greco-Roman wrestlers. Team USA comes off a historic nine-medal performance at the 2020 Olympic Games in Tokyo, Japan.

The team is an exciting mix of experience and young talent. A pair of Olympic champions and two-time Olympic medalists are heading to a third Olympic Games—Helen Maroulis (WFS 57 kg) and Kyle Snyder (MFS 97 kg). Two other Olympic medalists are wrestling in their second Olympic Games—2020 Olympic bronze medalists Kyle Dake (MFS 74 kg) and Sarah Hildebrandt (WFS 50 kg). Also competing in a second Olympic Games will be Kayla Miracle (WFS 62 kg). There are 11 first-time Olympians on the U.S. wrestling squad.

Senior World champions who will compete in their first Olympic Games are two-time reigning World champion Amit Elor (WFS 68 kg), 2022 World champion Dominique Parrish (WFS 53 kg) and 2023 World champion Zain Retherford (MFS 65 kg). Retherford also owns a World silver medal. Other past Senior World medalists on the team include a pair of heavyweights who both starred at Michigan, 2018 World silver medalist Adam Coon (GR 130 kg) and 2023 World bronze medalist Mason Parris (MFS 125 kg).

Two-time Senior World Team member Joe Rau (GR 97 kg) is headed to Paris after coming up just short of qualification status for the previous two Olympics. Athletes who will be competing on their first U.S. Senior-level team are Kennedy Blades (WFS 76 kg),

Spencer Lee (MFS 57 kg), Aaron Brooks (MFS 86 kg) and Payton Jacobson (87 kg).

Three-time Senior World Team member Kamal Bey (GR 77 kg) was a late addition to the Olympic field for Team USA following a redistribution of allocations. He earned his place in Paris by finishing in fourth place at the World Olympic Games Qualifier.

Lee, Brooks, Blades and Bey are past age-group World champions with proven track records of international success.

WRESTLERS TO WATCH

Helen Maroulis was the first U.S. woman to win an Olympic gold medal in wrestling, doing so at the 2016 Rio Olympics. She made history for a second time by becoming the first U.S. woman to win two Olympic wrestling medals, adding a bronze medal to her resume at the 2020 Tokyo Olympics. She is back in Paris as the first female U.S. wrestler to compete in three Olympic Games and is looking to become the first to win two gold medals.

Kyle Snyder is on pace to become one of the most credentialled wrestlers of all-time. He became the youngest U.S. wrestler to win the Olympics, doing so at the 2016 Rio Olympics at age 20. He followed with a silver medal outing at the 2020 Tokyo Olympics. He is a three-time World champion and seventime World medalist. Snyder is the most consistent performer on the World and Olympic stage in U.S. wrestling history. He has won a medal at the World Championships or Olympic Games every year since his Senior-level debut in 2015. A podium finish in Paris would give him 10-straight medal performances, extending his U.S. record of nine-straight medals.

TEAM USA WRESTLING OUTLOOK



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Sarah Hildebrandt has posted a remarkable international career with an Olympic bronze medal from the 2020 Tokyo Olympics and four World Championships medals to her credit. The one thing eluding her is a gold medal. She has earned a medal at every World and Olympic tournament since Tokyo and has made two appearances in the World finals during her career. If she can solve the style puzzle presented by the Asian countries, specifically Japan and Mongolia, Hildebrandt will be well positioned to get her gold. Of note, Hildebrandt brought in her brother, Drew, who was a NCAA Div. I wrestler for Central Michigan and Penn State, earning All-America status for the Chippewas, to be her primary training partner for the Olympics.

Kyle Dake is a four-time World champion, five-time World medalist and earned bronze at the 2020 Tokyo Olympics. He has been the standard bearer at 74 kg this Olympic quad. After winning back-to-back World titles in 2021 and 2022, Dake was defeated in the 2023 World finals by Tokyo Olympic champion and three-time World champion Zaurbek Sidakov of Russia. With Sidakov not participating in Paris, Dake is the odds-on-favorite in his weight class.

TOP STORYLINES

Men's freestyle enters Paris as back-toback World champions

The U.S. men's freestyle program enters Paris with more upward momentum than ever, having won back-to-back team World titles in 2022 and 2023. Two years ago, the U.S. won eight World medals of a possible 10 in men's freestyle, followed by seven World medals last year. Six different athletes won individual World titles in men's freestyle during this two-year

stretch, including three Olympic Team members—Kyle Snyder, Kyle Dake and Zain Retherford. Four members of last year's World Championships roster qualified for the Olympic Team—the aforementioned trio, plus Mason Parris, who was a World bronze medalist in 2023.

Elor looks to establish herself as the top pound-for-pound wrestler in women's freestyle

Emerging U.S. superstar Amit Elor can solidify her spot as the pound-for-pound best female wrestler in the world with a gold medal outing in Paris. The 20-year-old prodigy is an eight-time gold medalist at World Championship events across the U17, U20, U23 and Senior age divisions. She has already set multiple records for the U.S. women. In 2022, Elor reset the mark for youngest World champion in U.S. history at age 18. The past two years, Elor won gold medals at the Senior, U23 and U20 World Championships, setting another remarkable benchmark. Due to reduced weight classes for the Olympic Games, Elor was forced to change weights for her run to Paris. She dropped from 72 kg to 68 kg and looks as strong as ever, qualifying the weight class for Paris at the Pan American Qualifier and topping the U.S. Olympic Team Trials field. Elor is a two-time World champion on the Senior level with a perfect 25-0 record to her name. She is riding a 78-match win-streak with her last loss coming in the semifinals of the 2019 U17 World Championships.

Age-group phenom returns after extensive layoff to make Olympic Team

The re-emergence of Spencer Lee has U.S. wrestling fans enthralled and the 57 kg Olympic field on notice.

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Lee won age-group World titles for the U.S. in three-straight years (2014-16), once at the U17 level and twice in the U20 age bracket. He took seven years away from the freestyle circuit to focus on his collegiate career with lowa, where he was a three-time NCAA champion and two-time Dan Hodge Trophy winner. Since his return, Lee ousted 2020 Olympic bronze medalist and past World champion Thomas Gilman at the U.S. Olympic Team Trials, and ran the gauntlet at the "last chance" World Olympic Games Qualifier, to earn his place in Paris. His style of wrestling is suited perfectly for the freestyle rules set and puts him squarely in contention for a gold medal.

Brooks, Blades take over for Olympic medalists

Fans witnessed a changing of the guard at the U.S. Olympic Team Trials with Aaron Brooks and Kennedy Blades dethroning legends of the sport looking for a final go at the Olympic Games. Brooks, who is a two-time age-group World champion and four-time NCAA champion for Penn State, upended reigning Olympic and World champion David Taylor at 86 kg in men's freestyle. Blades, who is a U20 World champion and three-time agegroup World medalist, took the baton from sixtime World champion and Olympic silver medalist Adeline Gray at 76 kg in women's freestyle. Prior to these Olympic Trials results, Taylor and Gray were proven performers and top contenders for gold medals in their respective weight categories. It's now up to Brooks and Blades to uphold those lofty expectations.

Bey goes from first man out to Olympic podium contender

The most dynamic Greco-Roman wrestler on the U.S. roster, Kamal Bey, was given new life after finishing as the first man out of Olympic qualification status at the World Olympic Games Qualifier in Istanbul, Turkey. Bey finished in fourth place at the "last chance" Olympic Qualifier, where only the top three placers earned a place in Paris. Individual Neutral Athlete Sergei Kutuzov, formerly representing Russia, defeated Bey in Turkey and took a qualification spot. Thereafter, Kutuzov was ruled ineligible to compete in Paris, moving Bey into this qualification spot for the Olympic Games. Bey was a U20 World champion for the U.S. in 2017 and has long been considered one of the top Greco-Roman medal favorites for Team USA. Although he will compete in one of the deepest weight classes in Paris, Bey has proven he can compete well against the World's elite.

OLYMPIC QUALIFIER FACTS

- 291 wrestlers from 63 countries across six continents will compete in wrestling at the Olympic Games.
- United States leads all nations with 16 athletes qualified to compete at the Olympic Games. Japan is next in line with 13 qualified athletes. Azerbaijan and China both have 12 qualified athletes.
- Europe leads all continents with 109 wrestlers from 28 countries qualified to compete at the Olympic Games.
- United States, Japan and Mongolia are the only countries to qualify each women's freestyle weight class for the Olympic Games.
- Algeria, Lithuania, New Zealand and Uzbekistan will be represented in women's freestyle at the Olympic Games for the first time.
- Egypt and Iran are the only countries to qualify each Greco-Roman weight class for the Olympic Games.
- Honduras will be represented in Greco-Roman at the Olympic Games for the first time.
- United States and Azerbaijan are the only countries to qualify each men's freestyle weight class for the Olympic Games.
- Dominican Republic will be represented in men's freestyle wrestling at the Olympic Games for the first time.

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HERB HOUSE
National Greco-Roman Head Coach

Herb House was named USA Wrestling National Greco-Roman Head Coach in January 2024, being promoted from his role as National Greco-Roman Assistant Coach where he served admirably for over one year.

House is a long-time coach on the U.S. Greco-Roman scene across numerous age levels. He has been a member of the U.S. Greco-Roman coaching staff at eight World Championships, plus two Olympic Games. House was named USA Wrestling Greco-Roman Coach of the Year in 2018.

He has been a volunteer coach on a regular basis at the U.S. Olympic and Paralympic Training Center, working with the USOPTC resident Greco-Roman athletes, and helping at the many camps held there. He also served as a coach for the New York Athletic Club, which has won numerous national Greco-Roman team titles and placed many wrestlers on Olympic, World and Greco-Roman National Teams.

House has served as a volunteer leader within USA Wrestling's governance. He was the First Vice President of the organization for much of 2022. He previously served on the Board of Directors, has been the Chairperson of the Greco-Roman Sport Committee, and was a member of the Ethics and Membership Committee.

As an athlete, House was a successful Greco-Roman wrestler. In 1992, he won a U20 World bronze medal. On the Senior level, he won a bronze at the 1993 Pan American Championships. In 1997, he took fourth at the CISM Military World Championships competing for the U.S. Army WCAP program. Domestically, House won four University national titles, two Armed Forces titles and secured six top-five finishes at the U.S. Open.



JUSTIN RUIZNational Greco-Roman Program Director

Justin Ruiz was named the USA Wrestling National Greco-Roman Program Director in January 2024. Ruiz originally came to USA Wrestling in November 2022 as Director of Donor and Alumni Relations before transitioning to a leadership role with the Greco-Roman program.

Ruiz has extensive coaching experience, serving as an assistant wrestling coach for Utah Valley University for four years (2007-08, 2012-2015). For three years, he served as National Team Developmental Coach for Utah USA Wrestling, coaching multiple age-group All-Americans. He was a co-owner of a wrestling club in Orem, Utah, which developed numerous successful athletes who went on to wrestle in college. Ruiz also coached professional and amateur MMA fighters for The Pit Elevated in Orem, Utah for close to three years.

Ruiz was one of the nation's top Greco-Roman athletes for many years, winning a bronze medal at 96 kg in Greco-Roman at the 2005 World Championships. He competed in six Senior World Championships, two U20 World Championships and a University World Championships. He was a 2007 Pan American Games champion, and won a silver medal at the 2003 Pan American Games. He placed second in the U.S. Olympic Team Trials twice in his career. Ruiz was a member of the first and only U.S. team to win the World Team title in Greco-Roman wrestling, with its victory at the 2007 Senior World Championships.

In college, Ruiz was a two-time NCAA All-American for the University of Nebraska. He was a three-time Utah state champion for Taylorsville High School and was the recipient of the national Dave Schultz High School Excellence Award in 1998.

Team USA's "last man in" Kamal Bey ready for opportunity at hand

The 77 kg bracket will be one to watch, with a mix of young and experienced athletes battling for gold. The top seed is Nao Kusaka of Japan, a 2023 World bronze medalist. He is one of the younger competitors in the field with just four appearances at age-group tournaments and one appearance on the Senior level in 2023.

On the same side of the bracket as Kusaka are No. 4 seed Malkhas Amoyan of Armenia, No. 5 seed Yosvanys Pena Flores of Cuba and No. 8 seed Aram Vardanyan of Uzbekistan. Amoyan is a three-time World medalist. Pena Flores is one of three athletes with past Olympic experience, having competed at the 2020 Tokyo Games. Vardanyan brings experience from five World tournaments to the field.

Sanan Suleymanov of Azerbaijan, the returning World silver medalist, is seeded No. 2. Suleymanov has collected two World medals in four appearances. He also holds experience from six age-group World Championships.

In Suleymanov's half-bracket is reigning World Champion Akzhol Makhmudov of Kyrgyzstan, who holds the No. 3 seed. Makhmudov's dominant performance in Belgrade marked him as a serious threat for gold. At the 2020 Tokyo Games, Makhmudov returned to Kyrgyzstan with a silver medal.

Demeu Zhadrayev of Kazakhstan, an Asian Olympic Qualifier finalist, is seeded No. 6. Zhadrayev enters with Olympic experience from Tokyo, plus a World silver medal from 2017.

Zoltan Levai of Hungary, who secured his spot through the World Olympic Games Qualifier, is seeded No. 7. Levai is one of the more experienced athletes in the field with 14 agegroup World tournaments and a World runner-up finish under his belt.

For the United States, Kamal Bey will be making his first Olympic appearance. Bey, a three-time Senior World Team member, had success at the U20 level, winning a World title in 2017. Bey is coming off a gold medal finish at the 2023 Pan American Games in Santiago, Chile, last November, and earned a spot in Paris following a fourth-place finish at the World Olympic Games Qualifier after quotas were reallocated.

Rounding out an exciting field of competitors are Abd Elkrim Ouakali of Algeria, Aik Mnatsakanian of Bulgaria, Jair Cuero Muñoz of Colombia, Mahmoud Abdelrahman of Egypt, Jonni Sarkkinen of Finland, Amin Kaviyaninejad of Iran and Burhan Akbudak of Turkey.

Newcomer Payton Jacobson looks to announce himself to the world in Paris

Leading the field as the No. 1 seed is European Olympic Qualifier finalist, Ali Cengiz of Turkey, the 2023 World champion. Cengiz's dominance and technical skill have made him a top competitor, and he will be looking to add an Olympic gold to his two World medals in Paris.

Zhan Beleniuk of Ukraine, a returning World bronze medalist and twotime World champion, is seeded No. 4. He has meaningful experience at two Olympic Games, earning gold in Rio and silver in Tokyo. Nursultan Tursynov of Kazakhstan, the 2023 World fifth-place finisher, is seeded No. 5. Tursynov seeks his first Seniorlevel medal after five past World Championships plus an appearance at the Tokyo Games. The No. 8 seed is Carlos Munoz of Colombia, a Pan American Olympic Qualifier finalist and 2016 Olympian.

Returning World finalist and twotime World medalist David Losonczi of Hungary highlights the opposite half-bracket as the No. 2 seed. Semen Novikov of Bulgaria, a 2023 World bronze medalist and past European champion, holds the No. 3 seed. Novikov is a two-time U23 World champion.

Bachir Sid Azara of Algeria, a finalist at the African/Oceania Olympic Qualifier, is seeded No. 6. Sid Azara competed at the Tokyo Games. He has yet to make a Senior World or Olympic podium but did claim bronze at the U20 level previously. Aleksandr Komarov of Serbia, a

is seeded No. 7. Komarov seeks his first Senior-level medal after winning five age-group World titles.

87 kg is one of the more experienced weight classes with five of the 16 athletes drawing experience from previous Olympic Games. Sid Azara, Tursynov and Mohamed Metwally of Egypt competed in Tokyo, Munoz Jaramillo competed in Rio, and Beleniuk competed in both sets of Games.

The United States representative at 87 kg is Payton Jacobson. This is Jacobson's inaugural Senior team, drawing experience from his two age-group World Championships appearances. The 21-year-old is new to the weight class on the international scene. He has the element of surprise on his side as most in the field won't be familiar with his approach.

The last six competitors rounding out the 87 kg field are Rafig Huseynov of Azerbaijan, Haitao Qian of China, Turpal Bisultanov of Denmark, Lasha Gobadze of Georgia, Alireza Mohmadipiani of Iran and Arkadiusz Kulynycz of Poland.

From retirement to Olympian, Joe Rau takes aim at elusive medal

Leading the group as the No. 1 seed at 97 kg is Artur Aleksanyan of Armenia, the 2023 Senior World silver medalist. Aleksanyan's remarkable track record establishes him as a frontrunner in Paris. He will be aiming to add a second Olympic gold to his impressive resume that includes three Olympic medals, four World titles and seven World medals.

Two-time age-group World champion Abubakr Khaslakhanau, competing as an Individual Neutral Athlete, is seeded No. 2.

Mohammadhadi Saravi of Iran, a 2023 Senior World bronze medalist, holds the No. 3 seed. Saravi has secured three medals in four Senior World Championship appearances, including gold in 2021, making him one to watch in Paris. He also competed at the 2021 Tokyo Games.

Gabriel Rosillo Kindelan of Cuba, the 2023 Senior World champion and Tokyo Olympian, is seeded No. 4. Entering Paris, Rosillo Kindelan is considered the gold medal favorite.

Two-time age-group World champion Arvi Savolainen of Finland, who secured his spot through the World Olympic Games Qualifier, is seeded No. 5. Mindaugas Venckaitis of Lithuania, a European Olympic Qualifier finalist. is seeded No. 6.

Two-time World bronze medalist Mihail Kajia of Serbia was a late addition to the field following an injury withdrawal from Czech Republic's Artur Omarov. Kajia, a 2020 Olympian, slots in as the No. 7 seed.

Rounding out the top eight seeds is Kevin Mejia Castillo of Honduras, a Pan American Olympic Qualifier finalist. His journey to the Olympics has been marked by significant achievements, as he has competed at 13 World tournaments between all age-groups. Mejia is one of the more experienced athletes in the field.

The United States will be represented by Joe Rau, a first-time Olympian that intends to make his mark on the Paris stage. Rau has been a part of three Senior World teams and is a three-time Pan American Championships gold medalist. He came out of retirement in 2023 to make a run at the Olympic Games.

Others in the field are Fadi Rouabah of Algeria, Mohamed Gabr of Egypt, Roberti Kobliashvili of Georgia, Lucas Lazogianis of Germany, Uzur Dzhuzupbekov of Kyrgyzstan, Seungjun Kim of South Korea and Rustam Assakalov of Uzbekistan. Kobliashvili and Assakalov are two-time World medalists with past Olympic experience. Dzhuzupbekov was an Olympian in Tokyo.

American Adam Coon among athletes standing in the way of Olympic history

Topping the list of skilled wrestlers at heavyweight as the No. 1 seed is Amin Mirzazadeh of Iran, the current Senior World champion, Mirzazadeh is a two-time World champion and three-time World finalist. He draws Games, where he placed fifth.

Abdellatif Mohamed of Egypt, a 2023 Senior World bronze medalist, is seeded No. 2. Mohamed has competed at seven World Championships among the agegroup and Senior levels, plus two Olympic Games.

Lingzhe Meng of China, who placed fifth in the 2023 World Championships, is the No. 3 seed. Meng is seeking his first World medal after competing at six age-group and four Senior World Championships.

The No. 4 seed is Alin Alexuc Ciurariu of Romania, who earned his spot through the World Olympic Games Qualifier. Alexuc Ciurariu has competed at 10 Senior World events, earning a bronze in 2022, and will be a four-time Olympian when he steps on the mat in Paris.

Two-time World champion and Olympic silver medalist Heiki Nabi of Estonia is seeded No. 5.

2022 World bronze medalist and Tokyo Olympian Mantas Knystautas of Lithuania comes in at No. 6 as a late add replacing Tunisia's Amine Guennichi.

Yasmani Acosta Fernandez. representing Chile, was a finalist at the Pan American Olympic Qualifier, and is the No. 7 seed. Acosta Fernandez's resume is backed by experience from the 2020 Tokyo five Senior World Championships and Tokyo Olympic appearances. He previously competed for Cuba before transferring to Chile.

> Rounding our the top-eight seeds is Seungchan Lee of Korea, a finalist at the Asian Olympic Qualifier.

> 2018 World runner-up Adam Coon takes the mat for Team USA. Coon's powerful build and aggressive wrestling style will make waves on the Olympic stage.

> The top athlete to watch for in this weight class is four-time Olympic champion Mijain Lopez of Cuba. Lopez will be looking to make history in Paris, seeking his fifth Olympic gold. There has never been a Summer Olympian win gold medals in the same individual event five consecutive times. Lopez won gold in Beijing, London, Rio and Tokyo.



Kyrgyzstan's Sharshenbekov seeks third-straight gold at 60 kg

Leading the charge as the top seed at 60 kg is Zholaman Sharshenbekov of Kyrgyzstan, the two-time reigning World Champion. He has collected four Senior World medals and was seventh the 2020 Tokyo Games.

The No. 2 seed is Liguo Cao of China, who earned his country's spot in Paris by securing a bronze medal at the 2023 Senior World Championships.

The most experienced wrestler in the group is the No. 3 seed Victor Ciobanu of Moldova. This will be Ciobanu's second Olympic Games, adding to his extensive list of World Championship tournaments. He has competed at 12 age-group World tournaments and nine Senior World tournaments, claiming three medals. Ciobanu qualified through the European Olympic Games Qualifier following an eighth-place finish in Belgrade.

No. 4 seed Kenichiro Fumita of Japan adds a layer of depth to the competition as an Olympic silver medalist and two-time World champion. Mehdi Mohsen Nejad of Iran, seeded fifth, will be on the same side of the bracket as Fumita and Sharshenbekov, as will No. 8 seed Razvan Arnaut of Romania.

Uzbekistan's Islomjon Bakhramov, seeded sixth, is a returning World bronze medalist. No. 7 seed Raiber Jose Rodriguez Orozco of Venezuela was a Tokyo Olympian and is the reigning Pan American champion.

Abdelkarim Fergat of Algeria brings the total of past Olympians in the field to five. Egypt's Moamen Ahmed Rabie Mohamed is the only athlete entered in the weight that has not yet competed at a Senior World Championships.

Also entered to compete are Kevin DeArmas Rodriguez of Cuba, Enes Basar of Turkey, Aidos Sultangali of Kazakhstan, Seung Ri of North Korea, Murad Mammadov of Azerbaijan, Georgi Tibilov of Serbia, Enes Basar of Turkey, and IOC Refugee team entry Jamal Valizadeh.

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Tokyo gold medalist Orta Sanchez top contender at 67 kg

Leading the pack as the No. 1 seed at 67 kg is returning World runner-up Hasrat Jafarov of Azerbaijan. Jafarov is a two-time World medalist, earning one silver and one bronze in three trips to the World Championships.

Luis Orta Sanchez of Cuba, the reigning Olympic and World champion, is seeded No. 2. Orta Sanchez's powerful and dynamic style has earned him a gold medal at the 2020 Tokyo Games. On the same side of the bracket as Orta Sanchez is No. 3 seed Slavik Galstyan of Armenia, No. 6 seed Mamadassa Sylla of France and No. 7 seed Saeid Esmaeili of Iran.

Galstyan qualified the weight for Armenia with a fifth-place finish at the 2023 Senior World Championships. The 27-year-old has competed at five World Championships, earning a bronze medal in 2019. Sylla qualified after wrestling to the finals of the European Olympic Games Qualifier. Esmaeili brings unpredictability to this weight class, as we have yet to see him on the World stage.

Serbia's Mate Nemes, a 2023 World bronze medalist, holds the No. 4 seed. Nemes has consistently performed at the highest level, earning three World medals, including a gold in 2022. He competed, but did reach the podium, at the 2020 Tokyo Olympics.

There are a total of six competitors at 67 kg with previous Olympic experience. Orta Sanchez, Nemes, Ramaz Zoidze of Georgia, Souleymen Nasr of Tunisia and Parviz Nasibov of Ukraine were in the field at the 2020 Tokyo Games. Andres Roberto Montano Arroyo of Ecuador competed at the 2016 Rio Games.

Amantur Ismailov of Kyrgyzstan, an Asian Olympic Qualifier finalist, is seeded No. 5. Ismailov has one World bronze medal on his resume. Valentin Petic of Moldova is seeded No. 8. Petic earned his spot through the World Olympic Games Qualifier and was a U17 World Champion in 2016.

Also, in the field at 67 kg in Paris is Ishak Ghaiou of Algeria, Nestor Almanza Truyol of Chile, Mohamed Elsayed of Egypt, Kyotaro Sogabe of Japan.







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TERRY STEINER
National Women's Freestyle Head Coach

In 2002, shortly after the International Olympic Committee announced that women's wrestling would be in the 2004 Athens Olympics, USA Wrestling hired Terry Steiner as its first National Women's Coach. Since then, Steiner has built Team USA into an elite power in international women's wrestling and helped create opportunity that has led women's wrestling to become the fastest growing female sport in the nation.

Steiner heads into his sixth Olympic Games with a full six-athlete team, fully capable of a historic performance in Paris. In his five previous Games, Steiner has coached nine Olympic medalists, including Olympic champions Helen Maroulis (2016) and Tamyra Mensah-Stock (2020), plus two silver medalists and five bronze medalists. In 2020, Team USA had a record four Olympic medalists, and Maroulis became the first U.S. woman to win two Olympic medals. There were only four weight classes at the first three Olympics, and six in the last two.

At the World Championships, Steiner has consistently developed champions and medalists, and regularly scored podium finishes in the team standings. In the 20 Senior World Teams led by Steiner, the U.S. has won an astonishing 69 medals, with 21 golds, 17 silvers and 31 bronzes. The 21 golds were won by 10 women, with Adeline Gray winning six titles, Helen Maroulis winning three, and Tamyra Mensah-Stock and Amit Elor claiming two. Three U.S. Women's World teams have won seven medals (2003, 2022, 2023) and two teams had three champions (2019, 2022).

Under his leadership, the USA has also become a leader at the age-group levels in women's wrestling, developing numerous individual World champions and medalists, as well as teams which have reached the podium.

Previously, Steiner had worked as a Div. I assistant coach at Wisconsin and Oregon State. He was a talented Senior-level men's freestyle wrestler, a 1996 Pan American champion, who placed at the U.S. Open a number of times.

In college, Steiner was a 1993 NCAA champion for Iowa and helped lead the Hawkeyes to three NCAA team titles (1991, 1992 and 1993). A three-time All-American, he also placed third and fifth, wrestling for the legendary Hall of Fame coach Dan Gable. He was a two-time state champion at Bismarck Century High School in North Dakota. His twin brother Troy was also an NCAA champion at Iowa, a multiple state champion, and has been a successful coach at the college and international levels.

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KATIE KRIEBEL National Women's Freestyle Assistant Coach

Katie Kriebel was named National Women's Freestyle Assistant Coach in April 2022, joining the coaching staff, led by Head Coach Terry Steiner and alongside National Women's Freestyle Developmental Coach Jessica Medina.

Since joining USA Wrestling, the U.S. women wrestlers have won 14 Senior World medals, including gold medals from Amit Elor (2x), Dom Parrish and Tamyra Mensah Stock, while placing second as a team at both World Championships. The USA has also claimed 27 age-group World medals during the two years.

Kriebel was an elite wrestler, and developed into a successful coach at the college, high school and club levels. Competing under her maiden name Downing, Katie won World bronze medals for Team USA in 2005 and 2007. She was a five-time World Team Trials champion and three-time U.S. Open champion. Kriebel added a Junior World silver medal in 1999. She was a U.S. Olympic and Paralympic Training Center resident athlete in Colorado Springs, Colo., from 2003-09, where she returned to coach with USA Wrestling.

She served as an assistant coach at her hometown Pendleton Heights High School in Indiana from 2013-2022, first coaching the boys team, then a co-ed team and their growing girls team. She was the founder and head coach of Krieb's Club for freestyle and Greco-Roman wrestling in Indiana.

She was an assistant coach for the women's wrestling team at Oklahoma City University from 2011-12. She has been an active coach with USA Wrestling nationally, as well as with the Indiana State Wrestling Association (ISWA). She coached USA Wrestling's Senior Pan American team in 2011, and the U.S. team that wrestled in the Klippan Lady Open in Sweden in 2014. Kriebel also coached Team Indiana for the Junior and 16U National Duals in 2021.

Kriebel attended the University of Minnesota-Morris, which was the first college to sponsor a varsity women's wrestling program. She competed during the era before there were college women's national tournaments, earning medals on the USA Wrestling Senior circuit as well at the international level. She received the Willis Kelley UMM Outstanding Female Athlete Award in 2002. She competed on her boys high school team. Kriebel was elected to the Indiana High School Wrestling Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2010.

Sarah Hildebrandt returns to Olympic stage in search of second medal

The No. 1 seed is 2020 Olympic champion Yui Susaki of Japan, also a four-time World champion (2017, 2018, 2022, 2023), the dominant wrestler of this generation. Susaki seeks a second Olympic title and to add to her legacy within Japan's storied history. Add in age-group titles, and she has 11 World and Olympic golds. Her half-bracket will include No. 4 Evin Demirhan of Turkey, No. 5 Alisson Cardoza Rey of Colombia and No. 8 Oksana Livach of Ukraine.

Demirhan, a 2022 European champion who was fifth in the 2023 World Championships, is competing in her second Olympic Games. Cardoza Rey, also fifth at the 2023 Worlds, has limited international success, and qualified through the Pan American Olympic Qualifier. Livach, a 2018 Senior World bronze medalist, was fifth in the 2020 Olympics and was a 2013 U17 World champion.

The bottom half-bracket is more loaded with experience. The No. 2 seed is three-time Senior World medalist Otgonjargal Dolgorjav of Mongolia, a World finalist in both 2022 and 2023. She is short and very powerful. Her half-bracket includes No. 3 Ziqi Feng of China, No. 6 Sarah Hildebrandt of the USA and No. 7 Mariya Stadnik of Ukraine, one of the sport's top legends.

Feng, a 2023 World bronze medalist, was second in the 2024 Asian

Championships and a 2019 U23 World silver medalist. Hildebrandt, a 2020 Olympic bronze medalist, boasts four Senior World medals, including two silver medals. Hildebrandt has an explosive offense. Dolgorjav has given Hildebrandt fits in recent victories over the American. Stadnik is a rare four-time Olympic medalist (silvers in 2012 and 2016, bronzes in 2008 and 2020) and two-time World champion, but at age 35 is a longshot for the title.

Two past World medalists are unseeded and will be drawn in. India's Vinesh was a 2019 and 2022 World bronze medalist and is in her third Olympics. Anastasia Blayvas of Germany, 2023 World bronze medalist at 55 kg and a two-time age-group World medalist, dropped down in weight.

Other qualifiers are Cuba's Yusneylis Guzman Lopez, a 2023 Pan American Games champion and 2020 Olympian, four-time African bronze medalist Ibtissem Doudou of Algeria, two-time age-group World medalist Nada Mohamed of Egypt, plus Gabija Dilyte of Lithuania, Emanuela Liuzzi of Italy and Aktenge Keunimjaeva of Uzbekistan. Liuzzi was a late addition to the field after Son Hyang Kim of North Korea withdrew. The big question is if an anybody in this field can halt Susaki's dominance.

World champion Dom Parrish returning to gold medal form as Paris Games approach

The No. 1 seed is Lucia Yepez Guzman of Ecuador, a 2023 World bronze medalist and two-time Pan American Games champion. Yepez also boasts a 2021 U23 World title, and competed in the 2020 Olympics. Her half-bracket will include No. 4 Antim of India, No. 5 Maria Prevolaraki of Greece and No. 8 Andreea Ana of Romania

Antim, a 2023 World bronze medalist, won U20 World titles in 2022 and 2023, and a 2021 U17 World bronze. Prevoloraki, the most experienced entry in the draw, won three Senior World bronzes (2012, 2017, 2022) and will be in her fourth Olympics. Ana has won three straight European titles, was a 2021 U23 World champion and wrestled in the 2020 Olympics.

The No. 2 seed is Emma Malmgren of Sweden. Malmgren was fifth in the last two Senior Worlds (2022, 2023), won a 2021 U20 World title and was second in the Senior Europeans this season. Her half bracket features No. 3 Akari Fujinami of Japan, No. 6 Christianah Ogunsanya of Nigeria and No. 7 Quiyanu Pang of China.

Two-time World champion Fujinami, just 20, has pinned or scored a technical fall in all of her World matches. She won a 2018 U17 World title and most recently won the 2023 Asian Games. Ogunsanya has won two straight Senior African titles. 2020 Olympic silver medalist Pang also won World bronze medals in


The No. 1 seed is Lucia Yepez Guzman 2018 and 2019, and was a 2016 Asian of Ecuador, a 2023 World bronze champion.

Helen Maroulis in search of U.S. record third Olympic medal in women's wrestling


The No. 1 seed is three-time World World medalist (three bronzes, one champion Tsugumi Sakurai of Japan. Sakurai won her first World title at 55 kg in 2021, and the next two at 57 kg. In the 2024 Asian Championships, she lost in the finals to China's Yongxin Feng. Sakurai was 2016 U17 World champion. Her half-bracket will include No. 4 Anehlina Lysak of Poland, No. 5 Helen Maroulis of the USA and No. 8 Luisa Valverde of Ecuador.

Maroulis was the first U.S. woman to win Olympic gold (2016), to win two Olympic medals (2020 bronze) and to make three Olympic teams. She boasts nine World/Olympic medals and beat the legend Saori Yoshida of Japan in the Rio finals. To get another gold, she must beat Sakurai, who beat her at 2022 and 2023 Worlds. Lysak, a 2022 World bronze medalist, was fifth in the 2023 Worlds and a two-time agegroup World champion. Valverde, a two-time Pan American champion, was a 2020 Olympian and won 2011 U20 World bronze.

The No. 2 seed is 2022 World champion Anastasia Nichita of Moldova. Nichita won her World title at 59 kg, and lost to Sakurai in the 2023 World finals. She was a 2020 Olympian and 2018 U20 World champion. Her half bracket features No. 3 Odunavo Adekuorove of Nigeria, No. 6 Kexin Hong of China and No. 7 Guilia Penalber of Brazil.

silver) and is in her third Olympic Games. Her height and style offers challenges to top opponents. Hong earned China's quota at 57 kg at the Asian Olympic Qualifier and has three international golds so far in 2024. Drawing from Tokyo Olympic experience Kayla Miracle primed for Paris medal run

The No. 1 seed is 2020 Olympic silver medalist and three-time World champion Aisuluu Tynybekova of Kyrgyzstan. The most consistent star in this weight, Tynybekova won World gold in 2019, 2021 and 2023 and a bronze in 2017. She has won gold in eight of her last nine tourneys. Her half-bracket will be very tough, including No. 4 Iryna Koliadenko of Ukraine, No. 5 Bilyana Dudova of Bulgaria and No. 8 Kayla Miracle of the USA.

Koliadenko was a 2020 Olympic bronze medalist, 2019 World silver medalist and a 2023 World bronze medalist. She won three European titles and three age-group World medals. Dudova was a 2021 World champion at 59 kg, a 2018 World silver medalist at 57 kg and was fifth in the 2013 Worlds.

Miracle was a World silver medalist in 2021 and 2022. She has a potential quarterfinal battle with Tynybekova, who beat her in the 2021 World finals. She beat World finalist Macey Kilty to make U.S. team and has four agegroup World medals on the resume. Paris would be perfect timing for Miracle to stand on the top of the podium.

The No. 2 seed is Sakura Motoki of Japan, who lost to Tynybekova in the 2023 World finals and the 2024 Asian finals. She was third in the 2021 Senior Worlds and won U20 and U17 World titles. Her half bracket features No. 3 Grace Bullen of Norway, No. 6

Luisa Niemesch of Germany and No. 7 Ana Godinez Gonzalez of Canada.

Bullen, a 2022 World silver medalist and 2023 World bronze medalist, is the 2024 European champion. She won U17 and U23 World titles. Niemesch was fifth in the 2017 and 2023 Senior Worlds, competed in the 2016 Olympics and won three age-group World medals. Godinez Gonzalez was fifth in the 2022 Senior Worlds, won a 2021 U23 World gold and 2023 U23 World bronze and boasts two Pan American titles.

U.S. prodigy Amit Elor among six World champions in stacked 68 kg field

The No. 1 seed is 2023 World bracket. Two-time World champions champion Buse Tosun of Turkey, who also won 2018 and 2021 World bronze medals, and a 2018 U23 World title. She wrestled in the 2016 Olympics. Her half-bracket will include No. 4 Irina Ringaci of Moldova, No. 5 Tetiana Sova Rizhko of Ukraine and No. 8 seed Feng Zhou of China.

A 2021 World champion at 65 kg, Ringaci added World bronze medals in 2022 and 2023. She boasts U23 and U20 World titles. Sova Rizhko was a 2022 European champion and 2024 runner-up, and won two agegroup World medals. Zhou, with a 2015 World silver and 2018 World bronze, is in her third Olympics.

The No. 2 seed is Delgermaa Enkhsaikhan of Mongolia. Her half bracket features No. 3 Koumba Larroque of France, No. 6 Blessing Oborududu of Nigeria and No. 7 Soleymi Caraballo Hernandez of Venezuela.

Enkhsaikhan was a 2023 World silver medalist and won two age-group World medals. Larrouque has won four Senior World medals, including a 2018 silver and three bronzes. Age-group sensation Kennedy Blades takes first shot at Senior medal in Paris

The No. 1 seed is 2023 World silver American Games champion. medalist Aiperi Medet Kyzy of Kyrgyzstan, who was fifth at the 2020 Olympics and added a World bronze in 2021. She was a 2021 U23 World champion. In 2024, she won her third Asian Championships gold. Her half-bracket includes No. 4 Catalina Axente of Romania, No. 5 Milaimys Marin Potrille of Cuba and No. 8 Bernadett Nagy of Hungary.

Axente was fifth in the 2023 Senior Worlds and is successful in Beach wrestling. Marin Potrille was a 2018 Youth Olympic Games champion, 2019 U23 World champion and 2023 Pan American Games champion. Nagy won two age-group World medals and two Senior European bronze medals.

The No. 2 seed is 2023 World champion Yuka Kagami of Japan. Kagami claimed a 2022 World bronze medal, won two U17 World titles, a U20 World title and a U23 World silver medal. Her half bracket features No. 3 Tatiana Renteria of Colombia, No. 6 Hannah Reuben of Nigeria and No. 7 Justina Di Stasio of Canada.

Renteria, a 2023 World bronze medalist, was a 2023 U23 World champion and 2021 U23 World silver medalist. She was second in the 2023 Pan American Games. Reuben, a 2016 Olympian, was second in the 2022 Commonwealth Games. DiStasio was a 2018 World champion, 2017 World bronze medalist and a 2019 Pan

Perhaps the biggest name among the unseeded is 2020 Olympic bronze medalist Yasamin Adar Yigit of Turkey, also a 2017 and 2022 World champion. Adar Yigit also boasts a 2018 World silver medal and seven European titles.

2021 U20 World champion Kennedy Blades of the USA beat 2020 Olympic silver medalist and six-time World champion Adeline Grav to make Team USA. Blades has a 2023 U23 World silver and a 2022 U20 World bronze and her style is difficult to manage.

Davaanasan Enkh Amar of Mongolia was a 2023 World silver medalist and two-time Asian bronze medalist. 2023 European champion and 2017 U20 World silver medalist Yuliana Yaneva of Bulgaria has high hopes. 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BILL ZADICKNational Men's Freestyle Head Coach

Bill Zadick has been at the helm of the U.S. Men's Freestyle program as National Men's Freestyle Head Coach for eight years, leading Team USA to unprecedented success at the World and Olympic level. He has coached three U.S. teams to Senior World team titles (2017, 2022, 2023), including the first back-to-back World titles in American wrestling history. Under Zadick at the 2020 Olympics in Tokyo, all five U.S. men's freestyle wrestlers entered won medals, with golds by David Taylor and Gable Steveson, a silver from Kyle Snyder and bronze medals from Thomas Gilman and Kyle Dake. The 2024 U.S. Olympic team in men's freestyle features a top challenger in all six weight classes.

During the six Senior World Championships since Zadick has led the program, the U.S. has won an amazing 39 medals, including 17 gold medals, 11 silver medals and 11 bronze medals. Eight different athletes won the 17 gold medals and 15 different athletes compiled the 30 medals. The 2022 World Team had a record eight finalists. In both 2022 and 2023, the men's freestyle team helped the USA win the overall medal count in all styles for the first time ever. In 2017, Zadick was named USOPC National Coach of the Year.

Zadick has been a part of USA Wrestling's professional national coaching staff since 2009, when he started as Resident Coordinator and Assistant National Coach. Paris will be his fourth Olympic Games as part of the USA Wrestling coaching staff, as he was involved in London in 2012, Rio de Janeiro in 2016 and Tokyo in 2021. During his stretch as USA Wrestling's Developmental Coach from 2011-14, Zadick helped build the United States into a World power in men's freestyle on the age-group levels. This success has continued to expand since he moved to the top freestyle position, with Team USA setting new records at the age-group divisions.

As an athlete, Zadick was a 2006 Senior World champion, and also competed on the 2001 Senior World Team. He is the last American to win a World title at his international weight class. His younger brother, Mike, brought home a silver medal from the same tournament. Zadick was runner-up at the U.S. Olympic Team Trials in 2000 and 2008 and won two U.S. Open titles. He was a U.S. Olympic Training Center resident athlete at the time he won his World title.

He was also a NCAA Div. I champion for Iowa in 1996 and two-time All-American, placing fifth in 1995. The Hawkeyes won three NCAA team titles during his career under the legendary Dan Gable. He won four Montana state titles for Great Falls High School, one of the state's greatest athletes in history.

In 2021, Zadick was inducted into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame as a Distinguished Member, the highest honor.





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JOE RUSSELLManager of Men's Freestyle Programs

Joe Russell was hired as USA Wrestling's Manager of Freestyle Programs in May 2017, to work with new National Freestyle Head Coach Bill Zadick's staff. Since his arrival, the U.S. men's freestyle program has thrived at the Senior and age-group levels. Three U.S. teams won Senior World team titles (2017, 2022, 2023), including the first back-to-back World titles in American wrestling history. All five U.S. men's freestyle wrestlers entered won medals at the 2020 Olympic Games in Tokyo, Japan. In the six Senior World Championships during Russell's tenure, the USA has won an amazing 39 medals, including 17 gold medals, 11 silver medals and 11 bronze medals.

Russell has helped coach U.S. Senior and age-group tour teams to success as part of the freestyle staff, at the Olympic, World, Continental and Grand Prix levels. The U23 World Team program has been among the areas which Russell has focused. Since his arrival, the USA has won 20 U23 World medals, including seven champions. In 2023, the USA won the U23 World Team title, with a record four champions and six medalists.

Prior to joining USA Wrestling, Russell was the head coach at NCAA Div. I George Mason University. Russell led the program to 41 dual-meet victories and coached six wrestlers to eight berths at the NCAA Championships. Prior to his arrival at George Mason, Russell was a longtime assistant coach at the University of Minnesota where he helped guide the Gophers to three NCAA team championships and six Big Ten championships. In addition, he coached 11 individual NCAA champions, 31 individual conference champions and 84 NCAA All-Americans.

Russell has had extensive experience coaching the international styles with USA Wrestling throughout his coaching career. He was selected as coach for the U.S. Cadet Greco-Roman World Team in 1999 and 2013. Russell also coached three Junior Pan American Championship teams in freestyle and Greco-Roman in 2002, 2004 and 2014. While at Minnesota, as part of the Minnesota Storm coaching staff, he coached numerous national All-Americans at the age-group level in freestyle and Greco-Roman and did the same at George Mason with the Patriot Elite Wrestling Club. In 1999, he was named USA Wrestling University/UWW Junior Person of the Year.

In 2007, Russell was awarded the Medal of Courage by the National Wrestling Hall of Fame, which is given to a wrestler or former wrestler has overcome what appear to be insurmountable challenges, providing inspiration to others. Russell was an elite high school wrestler in Gresham, Ore., and was already competing on the Senior level in Greco-Roman while still a teenager. In 1985, a horrifying motorcycle accident left Russell fighting for his life and facing severe damage to his body and brain. With amazing will and courage, Russell battled back through a long and grueling recovery process to not only return to the mat, but become a success in all aspects of his life.

Age-group superstar Spencer Lee returns to World stage for Team USA after lengthy layoff

The top seed at 57 kg is 2023 World champion Stevan Micic of Serbia, who competed in college for Northwestern and Michigan and was a U20 World medalist for the USA before changing nations. His half-bracket will include No. 4 Meirambek Kartbay of Kazakhstan, No. 5 Zelimkhan Abakarov of Albania and No. 8 Gulomjon Abdullaev of Uzbekistan.

Kartbay was fifth in the 2023 Worlds and consistent in the Ranking Series events. Abakarov was a 2022 World champion and a 2023 World bronze medalist and originally hailed from Russia earlier in his career. Abdullaev competed in the 2020 Olympics and won the Asian Olympic Games Qualifier.

The No. 2 seed is Rei Higuchi of Japan, a 2022 World champion and 2023 World bronze medalist who won a silver medal in the 2016 Olympic Games. Higuchi is one of the top favorites in this weight class. His half bracket will include No. 3 Arsen Harutyunyan of Armenia, No. 6 Aman of India and No. 7 Wanhao Zou of China.

Harutynyan has won a bronze medal at World Championships for three straight years and won three straight European gold medals. Aman was a 2022 U23 World champion and 2023 Asian champion who is seeking his first World medal. Zou's best finish at the Senior Worlds was fifth in 2022 and boasts a U23 World bronze.

The rest of the field will be drawn into the bracket. U.S. entry Spencer Lee is on his first Senior-level U.S. team but won three age-group World titles won in dominating fashion. Lee has returned after overcoming injuries during his college career at lowa and is healthy and motivated. He was impressive while winning the World Olympic Games Qualifier.

Two other U.S. college wrestlers include Roman Bravo Young of Mexico and Darian Cruz of Puerto Rico. Bravo Young won two NCAA titles for Penn State and Cruz was an NCAA champ for Lehigh. Both qualified through the Pan American Olympic Qualifier. Cruz competed in two Senior Worlds, while Bravo Young has no Senior World-level experience.

None of the other qualifiers have been a Senior World or Olympic medalist. Aliabbas Rzazade of Azerbaijan has been a U23 World champion. Bekzat Almaz Uulu of Kyrgyzstan won a U23 World medal. Vladimir Egorov of North Macedonia, Gamal Mohamed of Egypt and Diamantino luna Fafe of Guinea Bissau and round out the field. Mohamed won the African/Oceania Olympic Qualifier.

Reigning 70 kg World champion Zain Retherford drops to 65 kg for Paris run

The top seed at 65 kg is Vazgen Tevanyan of Armenia, who won a bronze medal at the 2023 Senior Worlds. He is a past U23 World champion, boasts three age-group World medals and was a 2023 European champion.

His half bracket will include No. 4 Sebastian Rivera of Puerto Rico, No. 5 seed Maxim Sacultan of Moldova and No. 8 seed Tulga Tumur Ochir of Mongolia. Rivera competed for Northwestern and Rutgers. He won a World silver medal in 2023 and was fifth in the 2022 Worlds. Sacultan was fifth at the 2023 Senior Worlds. Tumur Ochir was a 2021 World bronze medalist and a 2023 Asian Games champion.

The No. 2 seed is 2022 World champion Rahman Amouzad of Iran, who also boasts three age-group World titles. Amouzad won the 2024 Asian Championships. His half-bracket will include No. 3 seed Ismail Musukaev of Hungary, No. 6 seed Haji Aliyev of Azerbaijan and No. 7 seed Islam Dudaev of Albania. Based upon past achievements, this side of the Olympic bracket seems much stronger than the top half.

Musukaev was a 2023 World champion, boasts two World bronze medals and was fifth in the 2020 Olympics. He wrestled for Russia before moving to Hungary. Aliyev is a three-time World champion and two-time Olympic medalist, with as deep a resume as anybody wrestling in

Paris. Dudaev qualified through the World Olympic Games qualifier. He won two age-group World medals for Russia before heading to Albania.

2023 World champion and 2022 World silver medalist Zain Retherford of the USA will get drawn in, because his achievements were at 70 kg. None of the seeds will want to wrestle him in the first round. A three-time NCAA champion at Penn State, Retherford considered retirement this year but instead went all-in on his Olympic

Other qualifiers non-seeded include two-time World medalists Alejandro Valdes of Cuba and Ernzar Akhmataliev of Kyrgyzstan. Valdes is in his third Olympic Games. Also in the field is U.S. collegian Austin Gomez of Mexico, who wrestled for Iowa State, Wisconsin and Michigan. Kotaro Kiyooka of Japan won the Asian Olympic Games Qualifier and emerged from a tough weight class in Japan. Others in the draw are Georgii Okorokov of Australia, Goderdzi Dzebisashvili of Georgia and Gaku Akazawa of Samoa. Okorokov, a 2016 U20 European champion for Russia, and Akazawa qualified at the African/Oceania Olympic Qualifier.

Team USA's Kyle Dake tops the list of gold medal favorites at 74 kg

Four-time World champion and 2023 World silver medalist Kyle Dake of the USA gets the No. 1 seed at this weight class and is considered the favorite to win the Olympic gold. Dake won a bronze medal at the 2020 Olympics in Tokyo and beat a talented field in the U.S. Olympic Trials to get his Olympic return trip. Zaurbek Sidakov of Russia, who beat Dake last year, is not in Paris.

Dake's half-bracket will include No. 4 Daichi Takatani of Japan, No. 5 Hetik Cabalov of Serbia and No. 8 Bacar Ndum of Guinea Bissau.

Takatani won a 2023 World bronze medal and won a pair of age-group World medals. Cabalov is a threetime World medalist, including a World gold in 2014. He competed for Russia through 2020 before transferring to Serbia. Ndum is a two-time African champion who qualified at the Africa/Oceania Olympic Qualifier.

The No. 2 seed is Turan Bayramov of Azerbaijan, who has been an agegroup World champion at the U17 and U23 levels. A 2020 Olympian, Bayramov qualified for Paris through the European Olympic Qualifier and was also fifth at the 2021 and 2023 Senior Worlds. His half-bracket will include No. 3 Georgios Kougioumtsidis of Greece, No. 6 Feng Lu of China and No. 7 Tajmuraz Salkazanov of Slovakia.

Kougioumtsidis was fifth at the 2023 Senior Worlds, won two straight U23 European titles and boasts an agegroup World medal. Lu was seventh at the 2023 World Championships and was a 2023 Asian U23 champion. Salkazanov is a two-time Senior World silver medalist, a World bronze medalist and a 2018 U23 World champion.

The top star being drawn into the bracket is Frank Chamizo of Italy, a two-time World champion and Olympic medalist who did not initially qualify for Paris. With the IOC selection of Individual Neutral Athletes (AIN) and the subsequent withdrawal of Russia athletes, Chamizo got in.

After initially being ruled out of the Paris field, Tokyo Olympic silver medalist Mahamedkhabib Kadzimahamedau has been granted entry as an Individual Neutral Athlete. He finished with silver at the 2024 European Championships.

Other veterans to watch are two-time World medalist Yones Emamichoghaei of Iran and four-time World medalist Geandry Garzon of Cuba.

Past U23 World champions Chermen Valiev of Albania and Razambek Jamalov of Uzbekistan are also in the draw. 2024 Asian silver medalist Viktor Rassadin of Tajikistan, who qualified through the final World Olympic Qualifier, was a 2026 World University champion for Russia. Also in the field are Amir Hussen of Egypt and Anthony Montero Chirinos of Venezuela.

Aaron Brooks overtakes Olympic champion to represent Team USA in Paris

Two-time World bronze medalist Azamat Daulenbekov of Kazakhstan gets the No. 1 seed. Daulenbekov was a 2024 Asian champion and has won three age-group World medals.

His half-bracket will include No. 4 Javrail Shapiev of Uzbekistan, No. 5 Magomed Ramazanov of Bulgaria and No. 8 Hayato Ishiguro of Japan. Shapiev was fifth in the 2023 World Championships and fifth in the 2020 Olympic Games. He most recently was second in the 2024 Asian Championships. Ramazanov qualified through the World Olympic Qualifier in Istanbul, and just started wrestling for Bulgaria after competing for Russia most of his career. Ishiguro was a 2018 U20 World champion.

The No. 2 seed is 2016 Olympic champion and 2020 Olympic silver medalist Hassan Yazdani Charati of Iran. Yazdani boasts three World titles. He was defeated by David Taylor of the USA in the Tokyo Olympics and in the World finals in 2022 and 2023. An injury reportedly threatened his Olympic run, but a recent win in Poland shows he is rounding into form.

His half-bracket will include No. 3 Myles Amine of San Marino, No. 6 Bat-Erdene Byambasuren of Mongolia and No. 7 Dauren Kurugliev of Greece. Amine, who wrestled for the University of Michigan, was a 2020 Olympic bronze medalist and won a 2023 World bronze medal. He has won two European silver

medals. Byambasuren, a 2018 U20 World bronze medalist, qualified through the Asian Olympic Qualifier. Kurugliev, who wrestled a decade for Russia, was a 2024 European champion and qualified at the World Olympic Qualifier.

Getting drawn into the bracket is U20 World champion and U23 World champion Aaron Brooks of the United States, who knocked off 2020 Olympic champion David Taylor in the U.S. Olympic Team Trials. Brooks, a four-time NCAA champion at Penn State, did not get seeded as he has little Senior experience. Another U.S. collegian in the draw is Ethan Ramos of Puerto Rico, who competed for the University of North Carolina. Ramos qualified through the Pan American Olympic Qualifier.

Osman Nurmagomedov of Azerbaijan has won three Senior World medals, including a silver medal at 92 kg in 2023. Vladimeri Gamkrelidze of Georgia was a 2023 World silver medalist at 79 kg, and a 2022 U23 World champion. Vasyl Mykhailov is a two-time World bronze medalist at 79 kg and competed in the 2020 Olympics at 74 kg. Kyle Snyder seeks return to top of Olympic podium, third-straight Olympic medal

Magomedkhan Magomedov of Azerbaijan gets the No. 1 seed at this weight class. Magomedov won a 2023 World silver medal and a 2022 World bronze medal. He was a Junior World champion for Russia in 2018 and switched nations in 2022.

His half-bracket will include No. 4 Ibrahim Ciftci of Turkey, No. 5 Givi Matcharashvili of Georgia and No. 8 Zbigniew Baranowski of Poland. Ciftci was fifth in the 2023 World Championships and was a European bronze medalist the last two years. His top age-group achievement was a 2017 U23 World bronze. Matcharashvili has claimed Senior World bronze medals the last two years and has claimed two straight European titles. Baranowski competed in the 2016 Olympic Games and has competed is seven Senior Worlds without a medal.

The No. 2 seed is sensational young Akhmed Tazhudinov of Bahrain, the 2023 World champion, who beat Olympic champions Abdulrashid Sadulaev of Russia and Kyle Snyder of the USA in his World debut. Originally from Russia, he did not represent them internationally at all. Tazhudinov has won eight of the nine international events he has entered for Bahrain.



Generations clash at heavyweight with Mason Parris in the mix as title contender

Amir Zare of Iran gets the No. 1 seed at this weight class. Zare is the top heavyweight of recent years, with 2021 and 2023 World titles, plus bronze medals at the 2020 Olympics and the 2022 Worlds. He won golds in the last five international events he has entered.

His half-bracket includes No. 4 Taha Akgul of Turkey, No. 5 Daniel Ligeti of Romania and No. 8 Zhiwei Deng of China. Akgul has won 10 World or Olympic medals, including a 2016 Olympic gold and World titles in 2014, 2015 and 2022. Akgul has won the last seven European Championships he entered. Ligeti had his best Worlds effort with fifth place in 2023. Deng, a 2016 and 2020 Olympian, won a Senior World silver medal in 2018 and a bronze medal in 2019.

The No. 2 seed is Geno Petriashvili of Georgia, who also has been at the top, with World titles in 2017, 2018 and 2019. He was beaten in the closing seconds of the 2020 Olympic finals by U.S. star Gable Steveson. Petriashvili also won 2016 Olympic bronze, and like Akgul, boasts 10 World or Olympic medals.

His half bracket will include No. 3 Mason Parris of the USA, No. 6 Giorgi Meshvildishvili of Azerbaijan and No. 7 Robert Baran of Poland. Parris won a 2023 Senior World bronze medal and was a 2019 U20 World champion. Parris won the 2023 Pan American Games and the 2024 Pan American

Championships. His only loss at the 2023 Worlds was to Petriashvili. Meshvildishvili was a 2024 European bronze medalist and earned his Paris quota through the European Olympic Qualifier. Baran competed in the 2016 Olympic Games and was seventh at the 2023 Worlds.

The top name unseeded athlete is Lkhagvagerel Munkhtur of Mongolia, a two-time Senior World medalist who was also a 2019 U23 World bronze medalist. Amar Dhesi of Canada, a 2014 U20 World champion, was a star at Oregon State. Another U.S. collegian in the field is Jonovan Smith of Puerto Rico, who wrestled for Cerritos College.

Yusup Batirmuzaev of Kazakhstan won a 2019 U23 World bronze medal. Coming from the African/Oceania Olympic Qualifier were Diaaeldin Abdelmottaleb of Egypt and Ashton Mutuwa of Nigeria. Aiaal Lazarev of Kyrgyzstan was a 2015 Asian champion. 2020 Asian champion Yasup Batirmurzaev of Kazakhstan and Oleksandr Khotsianivskyi of Ukraine, who is a 2019 World bronze medalist and two-time Olympian, are entered.

Weintraub graduated from Lehigh University, where he was a member of Lehigh's boxing team and named team captain his junior season.

He founded and coached a youth wrestling club in Forney, Texas, hiring 1988 Olympic gold medalist Kenny Monday to help coach, and supported Bishop Lynch High School, helping it to become a nationally-known program. For four straight years, including the 2008 Olympics in China, Silver served as the team leader for the U.S. men's freestyle team. He was honored with USA Wrestling's Man of the Year award in 2006, the NWCA's Dan Gable America Needs Wrestling Award in 2007, and was inducted into New York's Section 5 Hall of Fame in 2009.

Americans Brennan Goessl, Julian, Sylstad selected as referees for Olympic Games

United World Wrestling announced the pool of 50 elite international officials set to referee the 2024 Olympic Games in Paris, France, with standout American officials Casey Brennan Goessl, Sam Julian and Susanna Sylstad among the group.

Both Brennan Goessl and Julian have served as dedicated USA Wrestling officials for over two decades. Sylstad is slightly newer to the game, starting her officiating career with USA Wrestling in 2013 as an 18-year-old.

Brennan Goessl a native of Osceola, Wis., began officiating local wrestling tournaments in his home state of Wisconsin at age 12. He got his start as a USA Wrestling official in 1996 and received his international officiating license in 2004, being promoted to UWW 1S rank in 2013. Brennan Goessl has officiated eight Senior World Championships, three U20 World Championships and the 2020 Tokyo Olympics. He has served on the UWW Refereeing Commission, holding a variety of international assignments, since 2020.

Julian, who resides in Schuylkill Haven, Pa., picked up the whistle in 2002 and quickly joined the USA Wrestling ranks in 2003. His international career launched in 2008 and he quickly rose to UWW 1S rank after four years. Julian has refereed eight Senior World Championships and three U20 World Championships in addition to his two Olympic Games appearances in 2016 and 2020. In 2022,

Julian was presented the Golden Whistle Award at the Senior World Championships, recognizing him as a top official in the world.

The newcomer to the group, Sylstad has quickly risen in the domestic and international officiating ranks over the past decade. She reached USA Wrestling M1 status in 2016 and started officiating international events in 2017. Currently residing in Columbia, S.C., Sylstad has officiated the past two Senior World Championships in Belgrade, Serbia, and has worked two Pan American Games.

Sylstad will become the second U.S. woman to officiate an Olympic Games in wrestling. Sheila Wager was the first to do so, officiating the 1988 Olympic Games in Seoul, Korea, and the 1992 Olympic Games in Barcelona, Spain.

The U.S. will be well-represented in the officiating ranks come Paris. Its three referees are tied with Germany and Turkey for the most of any nation. In total, 36 different countries are represented in the 50-referee pool for the Olympic Games.

The referees for the Olympic Games were determined by members of the UWW Refereeing Commission, who began its selection process in 2023 with extensive evaluation and analysis of all UWW 1S ranked officials, and sent to the UWW Bureau for final approval.
