Dear U.S. Biathlon Members, Partners, Supporters, and Friends,

The close of the 2023-24 season marks the half-way point of the Olympic quad, bringing us within striking distance of the 2026 Olympic Games in Milan-Cortina! While this quad has so far been one of rebuilding after many retirements post-Beijing 2022, we can see that we are now gaining momentum and heading towards 2026 with more and more good progress.

On the race course, we've seen impressive momentum at all levels. Deedra Irwin delivered her best-ever World Cup and World Championships results, with an eighth place at the Lenzerheide World Cup and an 11th in the Nove Mesto World Championships Individual race. Campbell Wright saw his first-ever World Cup flower ceremony, with a sixth place at home in Soldier Hollow. And who can forget the men's inspiring fourth place finish in the Soldier Hollow World Cup relay for the best-ever finish for the American men in a relay since 1988. Over on the IBU Cup, Vincent Bonacci saw the flower ceremony twice with two sixth place finishes, and Team USA also delivered at the Junior Cup and at the 2024 Youth Olympic Games in Korea!

Our organization continues to make strides in many areas. Our Women's Leadership Initiative helped propel us to one of our most successful June Fund Drives in recent memory. The funds will help us bring eight talented female coaches from all over the US in both biathlon and Nordic ski programs to IBU and U.S. Biathlon events, coaching and learning alongside our excellent coaches and staff members. Additionally, funding brought in will help with our other key pillars, including athlete health and wellness, Project X, and outreach, promotion and mentorship. We feel there is huge momentum here, and the support of our donors shows we are headed in the right direction.

We've also recruited six additional Foundation members, who have committed to multi-year funding at the highest level. No doubt our Foundation trip to the Antholz World Cup event last season helped cement the support of several families, while attracting new faces as well! We're excited to come together again to cheer on the team in Ruhpolding in 2025!

We've still got work to do between now and the 2026 Olympic Winter Games, but the momentum that U.S. Biathlon saw this year shows we are on the right track. Thank you for being a part of that with us. Go Team USA!

Dear U.S. Biathlon Community,

A fundamental principle embedded in the fabric of our 2030 Plan, and what we wake up every morning striving for, is "excellence". We often refer to "sustained competitive excellence" as it relates to our Olympic goals, but excellence applies beyond competition to all aspects of our organization. It is a mindset, a process, a commitment to hard work and improving every day, to be collaborative and rise together. Bob references our "momentum" in his message and talks about our progress. This momentum and progress are the results of the dedicated focus on excellence that our athletes, staff, and volunteers demonstrate every day in promoting the sport, in education, youth development, partner relations, and elite athlete training and support. Excellence is a journey, and we are committed to the process, to recognizing where we can improve and strive together to be better every day as we pursue our goals.

This past year was one of growth across our organization, community, and sport. Our laser rifle Try It program expanded from 800 participants in 2022-23, to 2,400 this past year. Our membership, a gauge of participation, increased 15% over last year, and we had a record 80 participants at the Youth and Junior trials last December. We established an eight-event series for this coming year focused on increasing the number of biathlon racing opportunities for our membership and developing athletes, including three Regional Championships (roller ski), three International Trials (for the Youth and Junior Worlds, World and IBU Cups), and three National Championships – Youth and Juniors, Seniors, and Masters. To support the growing interest in biathlon, we launched our online learning portal, the U.S. Biathlon Center, which currently offers coaching and safety courses, with official and additional courses launching this coming year. Finally, the World Cup in Soldier Hollow welcomed over 11,000 spectators who witnessed inspiring performances by Team USA.

Complementing our commitment to growing the sport, we continued to focus on world-class support for our National Team and developing athletes. Partnering with Montana State University we launched physiological testing to benchmark our athletes' physical profiles and build data-driven training plans. We implemented 3-D motion capture and sensor-based performance analysis to guide technical skill improvements. For the developing athletes who did not qualify for the National Team but are critical for our high-performance program, we established the National Development Group (NDG) to provide coaching, access to resources and training opportunities. Our June team camp welcomed a record 34 athletes – National Team, Project X, NDG and elite youth and junior athletes – for a collaborative, highly productive and inspiring experience for all. We continue our commitment to providing a safe, welcoming, and supportive environment for our athletes. We initiated an independent audit of our athlete safety policies, practices, and resources to identify gaps and areas for improvement and enable us to provide an environment for that our athletes and community embrace. Our Women's Leadership Initiative, launched this spring, focuses on leading the





world in women’s participation across the sport and providing opportunities and support for female athletes and sport professionals at all levels, from grassroots to elite.

We completed our relocation to Soldier Hollow in Utah, the venue of the 2002 Olympic Winter Games, and now the venue for the 2034 Games. We are excited to be in the new, world-class facility, embraced by a community that is thrilled to be part of achieving our goals. 2034 provides an incredible opportunity to change the face of biathlon in the U.S. and Utah is the place from where to lead this change.

Watching the Olympics this summer reminds us of the power of sport to bring us together, to celebrate success, overcome obstacles, find joy in the journey, and strive for excellence. Biathlon is part of this positive influence of sport, and we would not have the impact we do without the support of our community. So a big thank you to our clubs, members, and volunteers who are the engine of the sport; to our partners at the USOPC and IBU and our sponsors who provide the resources that fuel our progress; to our Board for its leadership; to our athletes for the inspiration; to our trustees for their support, confidence and belief in our mission; and to my fellow staff members whose dedication to our mission and commitment to the community is unwavering.

We hope you enjoy the following pages highlighting our achievements and feel inspired that you have all contributed to our progress and momentum.

HIGH PERFORMANCE REVIEW

Training began in May 2023 on snow in Bend, OR. The team spent two weeks working on biomechanical efficiency and building base aerobic capacity.

June training in Lake Placid brought the Montana State University Physiology Department to the Olympic & Paralympic Training Center to conduct VO2 and threshold analysis on a roller ski treadmill, along with skiing economy and force plate analysis of ski technique. The data captured was used to identify areas of opportunity for each athlete, and implement specific training approaches to address these opportunities. The tests were run again in September, to see if progress had been made, and if so, how effective the training regimen had been.

We introduced a new international team selection process for the 2023/24 season, which used the International Team Trials at Soldier Hollow to select a pool of athletes to train on snow before the final assessment to determine World Cup and IBU Cup teams for trimester one. The selected athletes took part in a group camp in Vuokatti, FIN before heading out to their respective competition tours. It was a great opportunity to build a sense of team before the start of the long season. The team will follow the same qualification process this season and head back to Vuokatti in November.

The competition season was a big step forward for the team; with top tens in the non-team events on

both the mens and womens sides as well as historic relay finishes. Some of the most encouraging statistics came through in ski speed improvements. We saw several athletes, at several points in the season, with the capability to ski fast enough to reach the podium. The results are a clear indicator of the overall progress the athletes have made in the last few years. As we move into another competition season, we expect to see this progress continue.

LOOKING AHEAD

As we round the bend into the fall training season, we are looking forward to another critical camp in Soldier Hollow, Utah in October. This year, we will conduct group training sessions with Team Canada in order to build competitive pressure and push our athletes to higher levels. We will also hold our annual selection pool trials in Utah at this same camp. From there, shortly after the conclusion of the camp, athletes will head to Europe for the on-snow pre-season camp in Vuokatti, FIN before heading out to the first World Cup and IBU Cup competitions. Highlights this season will include World Championships in Lenzerheide, SUI, and the Olympic "test event" in Antholz, ITA at the end of January. This will be the first opportunity for our athletes to race on the Olympic courses and a reminder that the 2026 Games are just around the corner!

SOLDIER HOLLOW WORLD CUP RECAP

In March, the BMW IBU World Cup returned to North America for the first time since 2019. Soldier Hollow, the 2002 (and future 2034!) Olympic venue, with a brand-new competition building, played host to the biathlon family March 8-10, 2024. The well-prepared trails and beautiful Utah spring weather greeted athletes and the weekend saw over 11,000 spectators taking in the races and enjoying the sun and fun of the World Cup atmosphere.

Team USA did not disappoint on home snow. The U.S. men, led by Salt Lake City, Utah native Vincent Bonacci, put on a show to snag the top American men's World Cup relay finish since 1988 with a fourth place on day one. On the women's side, Margie Freed put together her personal best World Cup performance (32nd) in only her sixth World Cup start! Day two was no different, with Campbell Wright racing to his best-ever World Cup performance in sixth. His inspiring performance helped Team USA to deliver a strong finish on day three, with Wright leading the U.S. team in 14th place in the pursuit.

With the announcement of Salt Lake City as the 2034 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games host, there is no doubt the IBU World Cup will see more of Utah in the coming years. We're looking forward to welcoming back the biathlon family to our home snow in the near future.



SUSTAINABILITY

Thanks to a sustainability grant from the International Biathlon Union (IBU), U.S. Biathlon partnered with the Utah Olympic Legacy Foundation, host of the Soldier Hollow World Cup, and Waste Management Advisory Services to place sustainability first through recycling, reduction and reuse of products. Following the World Cup, WM Advisory Services worked with U.S. Biathlon to expand on the World Cup initiative and created an "Impact Reduction Playbook" - an easily moldable plan that can be adopted by biathlon clubs and others in the community, across the country.

PIPELINE DEVELOPMENT



The development pipeline supports athletes at all levels by enhancing grass-roots opportunities, coaching development and diversity, club growth, and recruiting athletes through clubs and Project X.

SPORT DEVELOPMENT REPORT

This past season, we tripled our biathlon outreach opportunities with 2,350 youth and another 1,000 adults participating in our laser rifle Try-It events.

We spent the 2023/24 season planning and preparing for two new regional events at Ariens Nordic Center in Brillion, WI and Soldier Hollow Nordic Center in Midway, UT to create a Regional Summer Championship Series that concluded in Jericho, VT in conjunction with the U.S. Biathlon Summer National Championships.

The 2024 U.S. Biathlon Coaches Conference was hosted at Ariens Nordic Center in Brillion, WI in June. While the 2023 Coaches Conference in Lake Placid, NY saw 24 coaches come together, this year saw 33 coaches participate in the weekend's presentations, demonstrations, and collaborative workshops.

Thirty-one of the best youth biathletes were selected to participate in our Regional Select Camps and Elite Development Camp. The future is bright with super strong and motivated developing biathletes!

LOOKING AHEAD

Three of our top domestic venues will host the U.S. Biathlon community this upcoming season: Soldier Hollow will host the Youth/Junior Nationals and Youth/Junior Trials in December, Masters Nationals & North American Championships are set for February 2025 at Ariens Nordic Center, and Crosscut Mountain Sports Center is set to host Senior Nationals, Collegiate Nationals & Spring Festival March 2025!



ATHLETE DEVELOPMENT REPORT

We saw a record number of participants at the 2023 Youth/Junior Trials at Mt. Itasca. Eighty participants traveled to Minnesota to try out for the Youth Olympic Games, Youth & Junior World Championships, Junior IBU Cup, and Junior Open European Championships teams.

The 2024 Youth Olympic Games took place in Gangwon, Republic of Korea in January. The six U.S. athletes named to the team raced at the 2018 Pyeongchang Olympic venue for biathlon and cross-country skiing. It was fun to see our up-and-coming athletes have the opportunity to participate in such a large event.

Overall, we are seeing a large group of youth athletes who are excelling in biathlon and strong cross-country skiers entering our pipeline through our Project X talent transfer program.

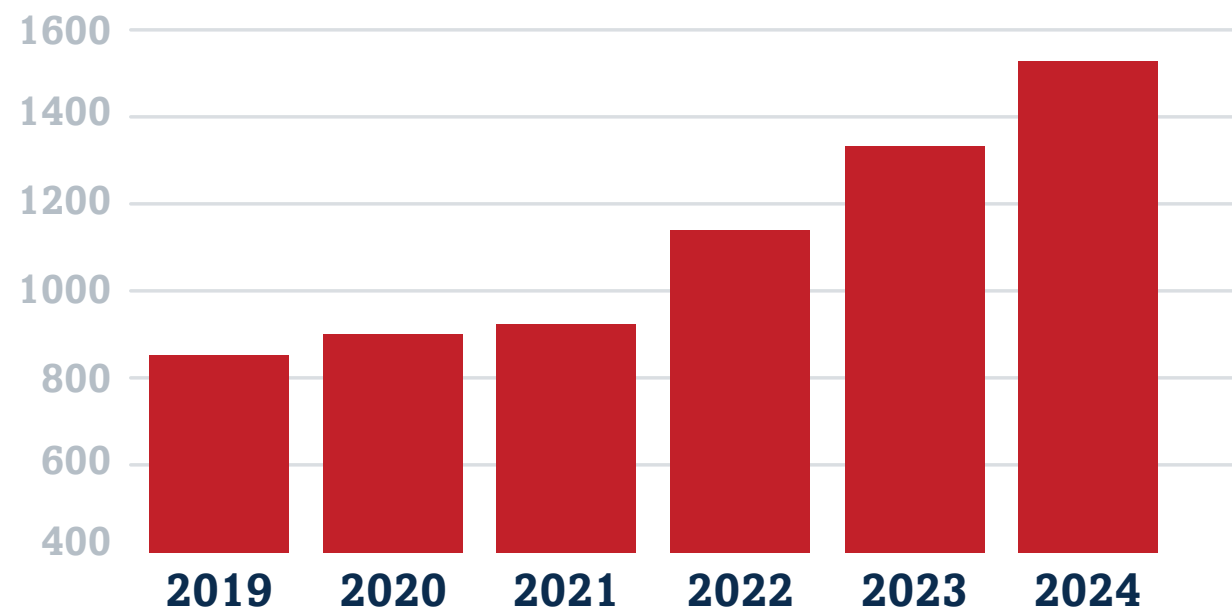
LOOKING AHEAD

Our **Women's Leadership Initiative**, launched this spring and integral to our 2030 plan, will address this gap and build strong and sustainable women's leadership in biathlon both at home and globally.

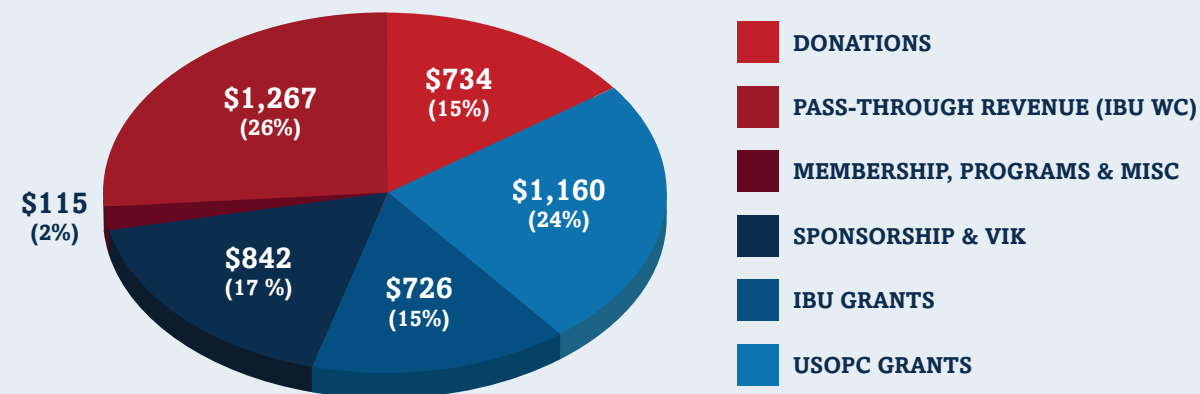

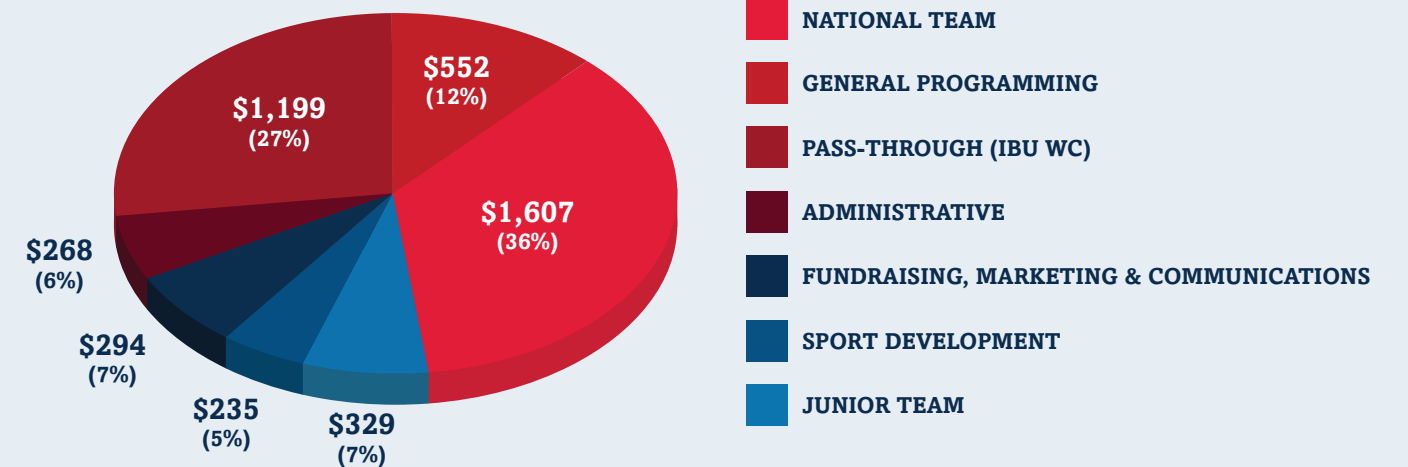

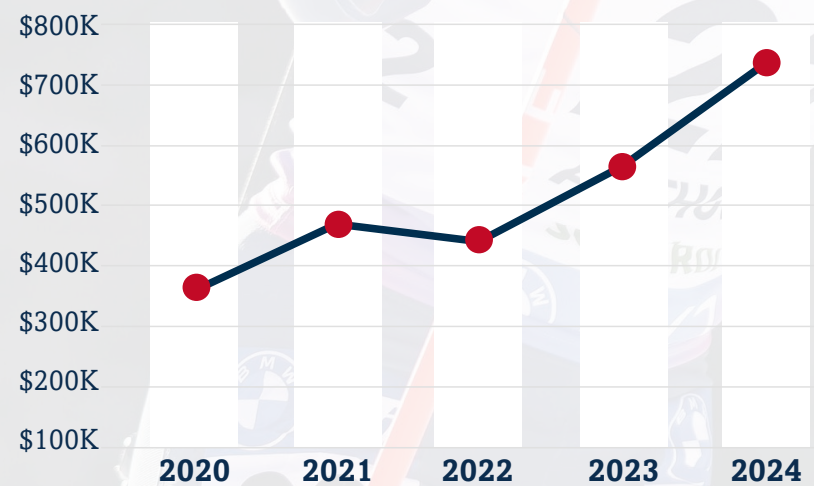
