The United States Field Hockey Association (USFHA) was founded in 1922 by Constance Applebee to govern women’s field hockey in the United States. Six years later in 1928, the Field Hockey Association of America (FHAA) was founded to govern men’s field hockey in the United States. In April 1993, the USFHA and FHAA merged to form the United States Field Hockey Association. Later that year, the name was changed to just USA Field Hockey.

- Grow the Game by promoting and continuing to develop the sport for future generations to enjoy.
- Succeed Internationally with competitive success and enhanced performance programming.

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MESSAGE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



A massive thank you to all those that continue to contribute to the advancement of field hockey at every level. Our sport provides for so many positive and enriching experiences, above all having fun with friends. Field hockey also builds amazing life skills; including teamwork, self confidence, growth mindsets, goal setting, communication, leadership, management of pressure, and as we all know, a wonderful place to build long-term relationship.

We continued to see an upswing in the number of athletes having amazing national experiences. The Sunshine Showcase at the ESPN Wide World of Sports in January was an amazing event, the biggest ever, with 245 teams from around the nation competing. Followed closely on the heels in February with 826 indoor teams participating in five indoor events in Lancaster Pa.; Richmond, Va., and Virginia Beach, Va. It is rewarding to see young athletes loving our sport, training through the winter as a team and having the chance to perform on a national level. The National Club Championship saw an expansion in 2023 with 24 teams at each age group competing.

At the highest level of the sport Team USA had a series of highlights in 2023. Early in the year, U.S. Men's National Indoor Team finished fourth in the FIH Indoor Hockey World Cup in Petoria, South Africa, coming so close to medaling. A historic result achieved by a committed and talented group. In April in Barbados, it was the U.S. U-21 Women's National Team who shone, taking gold at the Junior Pan American Championship, defeating Argentina in the final in a shootout and qualifying for the FIH Hockey Junior World Cup. Back in the Caribbean, this time in Jamaica in June it was the men and the women who excelled with both groups winning gold medals at the inaugural Hockey5s Pan American Cup. In the Pan American Games in Chile in October, the women came agonizingly close to toppling Argentina in the final, and securing Olympic qualification, but they would get one more chance in the FIH Hockey Olympic Qualifiers in January 2024.

Much success across all three disciplines of our sport, at full-field, indoor and Hockey5s. In fact, USA could be one of only four countries globally to have teams to currently play in the FIH Hockey Indoor World Cup, FIH Hockey5s World Cup, FIH Hockey Pro League and hopefully the Paris 2024 Olympic Games (along with The Netherlands, Australia and New Zealand).

USA Field Hockey's partnership at the high performance level with the United States Performance Center (USPC) reached new and amazing heights. The groundbreaking of the new state of the art National Training Center pitch took place with dignitaries representing the state of North Carolina at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte on May 18. Just 106 days later, the pitch was complete and the USWNT stepped on to the new turf for the first time. This partnership, which also provides strength and conditioning, sports psychology, mental wellness, athletic training, physical therapy and sports medicine support, will continue to be a difference maker to our international teams. We are so appreciative to Ike Belk and David Koerner, co-owners of the USPC, for bringing their Olympic vision to reality. We were the first National Governing Body to partner with them back in 2020 and now there are elite athletes from 18 other NGBs benefiting from their expertise and support.

Throughout 2023, the work of the federal government appointed Commission on the State of the U.S. Olympic and Paralympics continued. We played our role in support of the Commissioners, sharing our views as they explored the state of the 'system' of sports in the United States. While sport plays a major role in our society, there are challenges that together we must face to ensure a positive future. They include further addressing athlete safety concerns, lack of accessibility and affordability to sport, a low level of coach education, an insufficient focus and funding on sports development from the USOPC and other sports organizations, and other elements. We wholly agree and applaud these areas receiving needed attention and through 2024 and beyond will look to be an active participant in delivering solutions within the Olympic family.



Those that make up USA Field Hockey consist of a committed fifteen strong, volunteer Board of Directors who provide oversight, governance and strategy. A full-time staff of 30 who work diligently to provide amazing programs from grassroots through to elite. And a massive group of many thousands who umpire, coach, organize and support so much incredible programming year round. A huge debt of gratitude to those who provide the platform for so many tens of thousands of athletes to have field hockey as a central part of their lives.

The No. 22 U.S. Men's National Team opened the year with a training camp before a 3-Nations Tournament in Italy (June), 4-Nations Tournament in Czech Republic (July) and 3-Nations Tournament in China (August). In October, they competed in the Pan American Games, where they fought to defend their bronze medal title but ultimately fell short in a heartbreaking loss to No. 17 Canada. The Wolves also missed out on securing a spot to an FIH Hockey Olympic Qualifier.

The No. 16 U.S. Women's National Team started the year with a training camp in Chula Vista, Calif. before embarking on the fourth season of the 2022-23 FIH Hockey Pro League. In September they hosted Canada for a two-game series before competing in the Pan American Games in October. In Santiago, Chile, they took silver and secured a spot in an FIH Hockey Olympic Qualifier. USA closed out the year hosting New Zealand in a two-game series.

Both the men and women participated in the inaugural 2023 Hockey5s Pan American Cups (PAC) from June 4 to 11 at the Mona Hockey Field in Kingston, Jamaica. After thrilling final matches decided in shootout, both qualified for the 2024 FIH Hockey5s World Cup.

The Junior USMNT started the year participating in the Five Rivers Tournament in January, before two training camps in March. In April, they competed in the Junior Pan American Championship in Saint Michael, Barbados, where they finished fourth. They went overseas for a tour to Prague, Czech Republic in June before holding the Talent Identification Camp in July and two more training camps at the end of the year.

The Junior USWNT started the year with a training camp, before playing in the Junior Pan American Championship in Saint Michael, Barbados, where they won gold. In July, many athletes participated in the Junior and Senior Nexus Championship. In December, the U-21 squad played in the FIH Hockey Women's Junior World Cup, where they finished in tenth.

The senior Indoor USMNT started the year at the Rohrmax Cup in Vienna, Austria before competing in the FIH Hockey Indoor World Cup in February in Pretoria, South Africa. The men produced a historic run by claiming fourth, the team's highest ever finish at the event. The only competition of the senior Indoor USWNT was the FIH Indoor Hockey World Cup in Pretoria, South Africa where they finished in 9th place. The junior men and women competed in the annual CanAm Indoor Series.

U.S. Masters sent six teams to the 2023 World Masters Hockey Pan American Continental Cup in Buenos Aires, Argentina from December 6 to 14. The O-35 Men, O-35 Women and O-50 Women ended the tournament with appearances in the final, where they fell to Argentina.

The year started with the U.S. Men's National Team meeting in Chula Vista, Calif. from March 10 to 12 for their first training camp.

From June 27 to July 2, the No. 22 USMNT traveled to Pisa, Italy for a 3-Nations Tournament with No. 18 Austria and No. 28 Italy. Although they played four matches, only two were considered FIH Sanctioned.

Next from July 11 to 16 the squad was in Prague, Czech Republic for a 4-Nations Tournament against No. 28 Poland, No. 30 Czech Republic and No. 31 Ukraine. USA played five matches but all were not FIH Sanctioned.

In August, they traveled to Hangzhou, China for an unsanctioned 3-Nations Tournament with No. 9 South Korea and No. 24 China.

There was a training camp from October 5 to 8 in Charlotte, N.C. which served as the final preparation before the Pan American Games (PAG) that took place October 24 to November 5 in Santiago, Chile.

The now ranked, No. 23 USMNT started the Olympic Games qualifying event strong with a 6-1 victory over No. 41 Trinidad and Tobago. Next they met a tough opponent in No. 17 Canada. After leading following the first quarter, Canada equalized and found the go-ahead as the Wolves battled but dropped the contest, 1-2. In their final pool game they topped No. 35 Brazil, 5-1, to finish second in Pool B.

USA faced No. 7 Argentina in the PAG Semifinal, and although they held their ground, they were unable to score as Los Leones were victorious, 2-0. This put the now ranked No. 24 USA in the bronze medal game against No. 17 Canada, an important one, where the teams that finish in second and third secure their places at an FIH Hockey Olympic Qualifier in January 2024. An action packed game, Canada got on the board first but USA equalized just before the half. Canada tallied two more and the Wolves cut the margin late in the contest. A comeback effort and last minute shot went unrewarded as USA fell 2-3.

The USMNT closed out the year with a training camp from November 28 to 30 in Charlotte, N.C.

The No. 16 U.S. Women's National Team started the year with a training camp in Chula Vista, Calif. They then jumped into the fourth season of the FIH Hockey Pro League at the end of February and early March. They first traveled to Wellington, New Zealand to play two matches against each No. 9 New Zealand and No. 13 China. Next, they were in Hobart, Australia to face No. 2 Argentina and No. 3 Australia. USA came away with seven points, registering a victory over China and two shootout wins over New Zealand and Australia.

The USWNT returned to the United States to resume centralized training at Queens University of Charlotte's Bessant Field in Charlotte, N.C. In May, there was ceremonious groundbreaking on the dirt for the new USA Field Hockey field, supported by the United States Performance Center, and located on the campus of the University of North Carolina at Charlotte.

In the middle of June, the United Eagles competed in the second half of the FIH Hockey Pro League. First they had four games in London, Great Britain, two against No. 1 Netherlands and two with No. 6 Great Britain. Next, they traveled to Antwerp, Belgium to see No. 4 Belgium and No. 5 Germany, each for two matches. After falling last in the standings, the USWNT was to be relegated but in July, New Zealand opted to not participate in the next season of the FIH Hockey Pro League, keeping USA in for the fifth edition.

To help prepare for the Pan American Games in October, the squad had a training camp in Ireland from June 8 to 14 and hosted No. Canada for a two-game series in

Charlotte, N.C. It was overall a very successful series for the United Eagles – notching two wins against Canada that included scoring six goals and not allowing a single one against.

The Pan American Games, an Olympic qualifying event, took place October 24 to November 5 in Santiago, Chile. The No. 16 USWNT put up a dominant scoring performance against No. 47 Trinidad and Tobago in their first game winning 15-0. Next, they fell to No. 3 Argentina, 1-5, before registering a 3-0 win over No. 25 Uruguay in their final pool game.

In the PAG Semifinal, the now ranked No. 15 United Eagles went up against No. 14 Chile. After USA took a first quarter lead, Chile found the equalizer early in the fourth. Neither team could break the deadlock in the remaining time to force it into a shootout. USA came out on top after finishing 3-1 following four rounds. The gold medal game was a 60-minute battle against No. 3 Argentina. Las Leonas struck first and USA responded on penalty stroke just before the half. Tensions started to rise as Argentina pulled ahead midway through the fourth but the United Eagles fought with a late push that fell short, 1-2. With the second place finish, USA secured their spot in an FIH Hockey Olympic Qualifier in January 2024.

To close out the year, the USWNT hosted No. 9 New Zealand in a two-game series. The games were split with the Black Sticks taking the first one, 4-3, and USA winning the second 5-4.

Both the men and women participated in the inaugural 2023 Hockey5s Pan American Cups (PAC) from June 4 to 11 at the Mona Hockey Field in Kingston, Jamaica.

The opening day saw the two USA victories as the women put up a dominant scoring performance over Costa Rica, 8-0, and the men navigated a potential comeback by the hosts, Jamaica, but won 4-2. The second day featured three more wins, as the women shutout both Guyana, 8-0, and Paraguay, 5-0. The men had a close match with Puerto Rico which was decided in the final minutes for a 3-1 red, white and blue win. On the third day, the women registered yet another dominating shutout, 8-0 over Panama, as the men also tallied their largest margin, 5-0 also over Panama.

The women dove into crossovers on the fourth day and faced a tough Jamaica. After holding a goal lead at the half, USA dug deep to withstand some pressure by the hosts as they went on to win 3-0. Later that day in the semifinals, they took on Trinidad and Tobago for a spot in the gold medal match as well as a qualification berth. Tied 1-1 at the half, the United Eagles used persistence threats and smart decision making to secure the 2-1 win.

The following day, the men played Costa Rica in the crossover. Although it was scoreless until five minutes in, USA opened up and tallied two goals in each half to shutout their opponent, 4-0. Later that day, they took on Paraguay in the semifinals. A tricky opponent, USA held a 2-0 lead at the half and made the most of their opportunities for a comfortable 5-1 win. With the victory, the USMNT qualified for the FIH Hockey5s World Cup.

The women's final was a thrilling match from the start. USA held a 3-1 lead at the half, but Uruguay responded with four goals in the second to tie it at 5-5 in regulation. The United Eagles prevailed in the challenge shootout, going 3-1, to claim the Hockey5s PAC gold. Linnea Gonzales was named the women's Most Valuable Player.

The next day, the men's final was decided in a sudden victory challenge shootout round with Trinidad and Tobago. Trailing early, USA responded in the first half and had to come from behind again in the second to close regulation at 2-2. After also being tied following three rounds of the challenge shootout, the Wolves claimed the win in the sudden victory round, 3-2.

Both teams qualified for the inaugural FIH Hockey5s World Cup, slated for January 2024 in Muscat, Oman.

MEN'S JUNIOR HIGH PERFORMANCE

The Junior U.S. Men's National Team started the year playing in the Five Rivers Tournament from January 13 to 15 at the MG Sportsplex in Glendale, Ariz. The 14- team junior men's division saw the USA open with two victories, a 4-0 win over Edmonton Youth Club and 1-0 victory over Sunrinder Lions. On the second day, the Junior Wolves were topped by LA Tigers, 3-1, before falling to Rovers FHM, 4-0.

There were two training camps in March before the Junior Pan American Championship held April 10 to 18 at the Wildey Hockey Centre located in the Sir Garfield Sobers Sports Complex in Saint Michael, Barbados. They opened competition with a 3-0 victory over Guyana before falling, 4-0, in a tough contest to Canada. They rounded out pool play with a 3-0 win over Barbados. In the semifinals, USA went up against Argentina and were defeated 7-0. The Junior Wolves finished fourth overall after falling to Chile, 4-1, and narrowly missing out on a FIH Hockey Junior World Cup qualification.

In May, members of the Junior USMNT participated in scrimmages against the U.S. Women's National Team in Charlotte, N.C.

The U-18 and U-21 USMNT traveled to Prague, Czech Republic in June. The U-18 squad took on Austria, Czech Republic and Slovakia while the U-21 team faced Czech Republic in all three matches.

In July, the Junior USMNT held their annual Talent Identification Camp at the Chula

Vista Elite Athlete Training Center in Chula Vista, Calif.

The year ended with two more training camps, one in October in Charlotte, N.C. and the other in December in Chula Vista, Calif.

In January, the U.S. U-21 and Development Women's National Teams had a Selection Camp in Chula Vista, Calif. A month later, there was a Junior Pan American Championship Selection Camp for U-21 athletes in Charlotte, N.C., before another camp in March.

The U-21 USWNT headed to Saint Michael, Barbados to compete in the Junior Pan American Championship held April 10 to 18 at the Wildey Hockey Centre located in the Sir Garfield Sobers Sports Complex. After dropping the opening contest, 2-0, to Argentina, they won their next pool game over Uruguay, 4-1. After battling and finishing 1-1 in the semifinal regulation, USA finished strong in shootouts, going 2-0 in four rounds, to claim victory. In the final match, the Junior Eagles and Argentina were tied, 1-1, after regulation. USA executed on their shootouts to win 4-1 in four rounds and claim gold and FIH Hockey Women's Junior World Cup qualification.

In June, there was another training camp in Newark, Del., which featured intrasquad scrimmages. A few weeks later, many of the athletes participated in the Junior and Senior Nexus Championship in Virginia Beach, Va.

To round out the year, the No. 5 U-21 USWNT participated in the FIH Hockey Women's Junior World Cup from December 6 to 17 in Santiago, Chile. USA kicked off their campaign with a 2-1 win over No. 15 Japan, before being bested by No. 4 England, 5-2. In their final pool game they needed a five-goal win to finish in the top half of their pool, and the Junior Eagles fell just short of that with a 6-2 win over No. 12 New Zealand. In the crossovers, they had a dominant, 8-0, win over No. 18 Canada and defeated No. 23 Chile, 5-1, to secure a spot in the 9th/10th place match. Up against a tough No. 6 India, USA spent much of the match tied and eventually fell in sudden victory shootouts, 3-2.

The U.S. Men's National Indoor Team headed to Vienna, Austria for the Rohrmax Cup from January 5 to 8 where they played Indonesia, SV Arminen and the U-21 squads of Czech Republic and Switzerland. The group took home gold after a close hard, fought 3-2 deciding match against SV Arminen.

In February, the senior men competed in the FIH Indoor Hockey World Cup in Pretoria, South Africa. The No. 18 USA produced a historic run, topping Czech Republic (4-3), South Africa (5-2), Argentina (7-4) and Australia (4-2) in pool play, and only falling to Iran (8-3). Finishing at the top of Pool B, the Wolves made history, securing their first-ever spot in the quarterfinals. Tied at the half, USA made the most of their chances and withstood No. 16 Namibia's persistent attack to win, 3-2, and advance to the 3rd/4th place game. For the bronze, USA came from behind twice as regulation ended tied at 4-4. The Wolves unfortunately fell in the shootout, 2-3, but claimed fourth, the team's highest ever finish at the event.

The junior and senior men competed in the annual CanAm Indoor Series against their respective counterparts at the University of Toronto in Toronto, Canada on March 18 and 19. A valuable learning tournament, both sides played three matches.

To finish the year, the senior men traveled to Cape Town, South Africa for the Nkosi Cup from December 15 to 19. there they played against Namibia and South Africa, playing each nation twice.

After a few training camps, the senior No. 12 U.S. Women's National Indoor Team competed in the FIH Indoor Hockey World Cup in Pretoria, South Africa from February 5 to 11. In their opening match against No. 9 Australia, the young USA side showed early promise with the match tied at halftime, but they were unable to tally anymore goals as Australia went on to win, 4-2. In their second game, No. 8 Austria jumped to an early lead and USA fought back to even the game, but an unlucky penalty corner goal by their opponents was the game decider as the red, white and blue fell 2-1. Eager to come away with points in their third pool game, USA took a 2-0 lead early in the third quarter but No. 14 South Africa responded by producing two goals within a minute span as the game finished in a 2-2 tie. USA met New Zealand on the fourth day, strong play led them to a high-scoring 9-0 victory. USA faced their toughest pool opponent in No. 2 The Netherlands on the final day before crossovers. The Oranje got on the board first, but the United Eagles made the most of their limited offensive opportunities to always equalize when needed. After tying the match at 2-2 in the third quarter, The Netherlands prevailed and found the game-winner in the final minute to capture the 3-2 win.

In the 9th/10th place game, USA closed out their campaign with a win over No. 11 Kazakhstan and secured their highest finish ever at the event. The red, white and blue jumped to a two-goal lead after the first quarter and never looked back, and even withstood a full second half where Kazakhstan opted to pull their goalkeeper, for the 5-1 final.

The junior women competed in the annual CanAm Indoor Series against their respective counterpart at the University of Toronto in Toronto, Canada on March 18 and 19. The Junior Eagles started off the weekend with a strong 6-3 victory. In their secondgame later on the first day, it saw tactical changes from both sides, leading to a lower scoring, 2-2, but equally exciting game. USA closed out the series with a 5-3 win.

USA Field Hockey endorses U.S. Masters Teams in international competition for both indoor and outdoor, as required by the International Hockey Federation (FIH), Pan American Hockey Federation (PAHF) and World Masters Hockey (WMH).

In July, Caroline Nelson-Nichols was named as Director of Masters High Performance with her primary objective on assisting USA in succeeding internationally at the WMH Masters World Cups. Through her guidance, U.S. Masters launched a new program of camps, trials, tournaments, practices, and athletic program for the training squads in the lead up to 2024.

USA sent two men's teams to the 2023 World Masters Hockey (WMH) Pan American Continental Cup (PACC) in Buenos Aires, Argentina from December 6 to 14. The U.S. O-35 Men's Masters Team ended the tournament with appearances in the final, where they fell to Argentina, 0-2. Los Leones scored first, converting on a penalty corner rebound halfway through the first quarter. USA applied pressure for the rest of the first half but could not capitalize on their several scoring opportunities. USA picked up their intensity in the third quarter, nearly missing out on the equalizer several times. Against the run of play, USA gave away a penalty stroke that put them down two goals heading into the final frame. The fourth quarter was dominated by USA, but despite earning five set piece opportunities, the team was unable to capitalize as the Argentina defense held strong.

U.S. Masters is led mostly through volunteers on the U.S. Masters Transition team who launched roughly 15 committees of volunteers to accomplish the program demands. WMH requires USA Field Hockey to provide exclusive endorsement for the U.S. Men's and Women's Masters Teams, but the athletes are self-funded for international competitions.

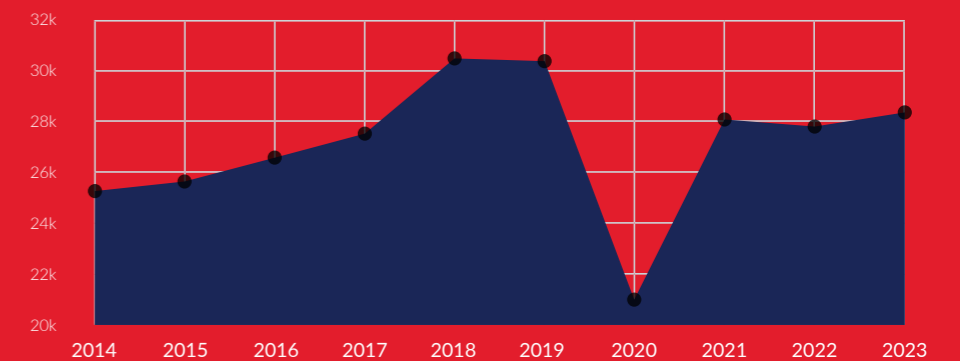

SafeSport Training is mandated for all members that have authority over and/or regular contact with minor athletes. Coaches, umpires and club administrators also must be background screened through a comprehensive screening. USA Field Hockey expanded its Response and Resolution Policy, revamped the Ethics Committee, and updated the Ethics and Judicial Grievance Policies to better serve members.

USA Field Hockey's membership stayed relatively steady through 2023. The Membership Department's top priority through 2023 was continuing to provide members with excellent customer service while looking to improve user experience in the future.

OLYMPIC DEVELOPMENT PATHWAY PROGRAM

For the second year in a row the National Indoor Festival occurred again at the Virginia Beach Sports Center in Virginia Beach, Va. Reflecting on this last year's achievements, they are motivated by the collective effort and dedication within the coaching community. Looking forward, they are excited to continue their efforts to support field hockey coaching and certification across the United States, supported by partnerships with the U.S. Olympic and Paralympic Committee (USOPC), National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA), National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and National Federation of State High School Association (NFHS).

COACH EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

USOPC

Coach Education's partnership with the USOPC has grown stronger through their participation in the USOPC Coach Developers Meeting in Colorado Springs, Colo. This gathering of National Governing Bodies from various sports provided a valuable opportunity to exchange best practices and insights. The USOPC's Coach Education Department awarded field hockey with a much-needed grant to conduct the 2023 Coach Educator Trainings and High Performance Summit. This funding was instrumental in fostering collaboration between high school, collegiate and high performance staff, highlighting the interconnectedness of the sport's various levels. The timing of the Coach Educator Training, just before the High Performance Summit, allowed for broader participation and a rich learning environment.

NFHCA CONVENTION

The year began with efforts to certify Level 2 coaches at the National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA) Convention in Sanford, Fla. This showcased the Coach Education's commitment to professional development and important partnership with the NFHCA.

COACH EDUCATION EVENTS

COACH EDUCATOR TRAINING & WORKSHOPS

Coach Education offered an invite only Coach Educator Training on May 15 and 16 in Charlotte, N.C. The Lead Coach Educator was Phil Edwards. There was also two Technical Skills Workshops which took place. One was on May 20 in Allentown, Pa. and the other was August 9 in Frederick, Md.

HIGH PERFORMANCE SUMMIT

A new and exceptional professional development opportunity, the two-day High Performance Summit took place May 17 and 18 at Queens University of Charlotte's Bessant Field in Charlotte, N.C. The two full-day Summit was a milestone event, featuring interactive observation tasks during an intrasquad scrimmage and a U.S. Women's National Team training session for the 75 registrants. Followed by in-depth review presentations and discussions, these sessions provided coaches with a deeper dive into coaching principles and strategies. Direct interactions with the High Performance Staff further enriched the learning experience, marking the summit as a critical step forward in coaching development.

The success of the Summit, characterized by the staff's willingness to share knowledge and the active involvement of coaches, achieved its aim of improving coaching skills, thus advancing the sport and supporting the U.S. National Teams ahead of the Olympic Qualification tournaments.

NEXUS

The Coach Education Department supported the Olympic Development Pathway Program, Nexus. Coaches from across the country were led by Junior High Performance Director Grant Fulton, and North Carolina State Chapter President and former collegiate coach Amy Robertson. Both played vital roles as lead mentors at the Nexus Championship through conversations and tactical video discussions, enhancing the developmental experience for all involved.

AAU JUNIOR OLYMPIC GAMES

Coach Education continued to provide additional support to the coaches at the AAU Junior Olympic Games. This event, which took place August 2 to 5 at the University of Iowa in Iowa City, Iowa, was led by Coach Educator Ange Bradley. She offered feedback, meet with coaches one-on-one, held group meetings and did video sessions.

NATIONAL COACHES FORUM

The 2023 National Coaches Forum (NCF) was again held virtually on November 29 and 30 and attended by 145 coaches from across the country. The Coach Education and Learning team invited presenters from around the world to join the annual event.

It was another busy year for the umpiring department and for USA Field Hockey officials locally, regionally, nationally and internationally. USA Field Hockey's Director of Umpiring Sean Rapaport, and Umpire Services Coordinator Brian Tyson, began 2023 just four months into their respective roles and with a lot of 'firsts' ahead of them.

One of the priorities of the Umpire Department was to secure the services of umpires to officiate at the various USA Field Hockey Events. Not content with feet on fields and whistles in hands, they sought to update the database, rate umpires appropriately and introduce an application system (where appointments are based inter alia on development pathways, levels of skill and training opportunities).

The Umpire Department successfully filled all slots for the following events, with an oversubscription of interest in many cases: Sunshine Showcase, National Hockey Festival, Regional and National Club Championship (NCC), Nexus Championship (NXC), National Indoor Tournament Qualifiers, National Indoor Tournament and AAU Junior Olympic Games. The NCC and NXC were identified as excellent opportunities for talent identification, development and training of umpires as well as umpire managers. One-on-one and group feedback sessions were plentiful and extremely well received.

Umpire managers play a crucial role in the identification, retention and development of umpires. Many experienced umpire managers worked the events, lending decades of expertise. The sharing of ideas and principles brought with it many successes and fresh thinking. Three newer umpire managers – Amy Baxter, Suzi Sutton and Saleem Aaron – will be attending further training.

The Umpire Department continued to host virtual clinics and in August held the annual 3-week Beginner and Level 1 Umpire Clinic that 261 attended. This offering welcomed many new umpires as well as athletes, coaches and parents into the fold to learn more about the game from an officiating perspective.

USA Field Hockey's Umpire Membership grew 8.5 percentage in 2023, with the organization continuing to engage with partners, NFHS and NFCA, in addressing the shortage of quality umpires at all levels of the sport.

Extensive collaboration has been done with the Sport Development and Coach Education Departments to bring general field hockey educational resources online.

Rapaport has worked with the High Performance, Junior High Performance and Coach Education Departments to engage with coaches at the college, club and school level. He presented at both the High Performance Summit and National Coaches Forum.

2023 INTERNATIONAL APPOINTMENTS

Allie Mikelson received her FIH International Umpire Badge and was also deservedly recognized as the 2023 USA Field Hockey Umpire of the Year. Gus Soteriades was promoted to the international panel of umpire managers, while Steve Horgan retired from his role as an international umpire manager at the conclusion of the Pan American Games.

USA Field Hockey's vision is for field hockey to thrive in the United States. Growing the game and driving local, regional and national opportunities for all to play, umpire, coach, watch and enjoy, both recreationally and competitively, is essential to achieving this vision.

The Sport Development Department's strategy is to focus on and invest in cultivating strategic partners and build sustainable structures to support existing field hockey and fuel growth of new hockey opportunities. USA Field Hockey continues to create tools and resources to support partners in growing the game as a sport for all, sport for life.

STATE CHAPTERS

In 2023, USA Field Hockey expanded its system of regional representation to nine State Chapters.

State Chapters are volunteer-led extensions of USA Field Hockey. Local leaders are elected by members within their state. Leaders develop strategic plans to drive grassroots growth, collaborating with USA Field Hockey and leaders from other states.

Current State Chapters: Colorado, Kentucky, Michigan, Missouri, New York, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Texas

State chapters are making an impact! In 2023,

- There was an increased high school programs and participation in Michigan and North Carolina
- Texas piloted the State Chapter Hockey5s event to recognize their high school all-stars
- Missouri hosted a Launch Party in October
- New York developed a league
- North Carolina hosted a qualifier with the lifetime engagement committee, partnering with the United States Field Hockey League for their adult teams to play in their Regional Club Championship

PARTNERS



High Schools represent the broadest base of field hockey in the United States, with more than 1,800 high schools and 60,000 student-athletes playing across 25 states. USA Field Hockey

has a strong partnership with the National Federation of State High School Association (NFHS) and their association leaders.

USA Field Hockey works with the NFHS to advocate for field hockey in multiple ways, including growth of programs to new schools, expansion within existing programs, sanctioning, coach and umpire education and certification, sportsmanship, rule alignment, communication of field hockey opportunities, development of student leadership initiatives, and more. USA Field Hockey attended the NFHS's Rules Committee Meetings, continues to contribute to the Pre-Season Guide, and collaborate with leaders at the NFHS Summer Meeting.



The Field Hockey Forward (FHF) initiative is an on-going collaboration between USA Field Hockey and the National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA) to sustain and grow NCAA field hockey at the Division

I, II and III levels.

In 2023, FHF worked with consultant MB Sports, resulting in meetings with eight Division I institutions, two Division I conferences, five Division II institutions, one Division III institution and one Division III conference, as well as numerous conversations with collegiate leaders.

The landscape of NCAA field hockey continued to expand in 2023 with the announcement of four new programs. At the Division II level, Roberts Wesleyan University in Rochester, N.Y. kicked off their inaugural season in 2023, while D'Youville University, located in Buffalo, N.Y., is set to debut their field hockey program in the fall of 2024. At the Division III level, the University of Hartford in Connecticut announced its plans to join the field hockey community, with the sport slated to commence in the fall of 2025 Penn State Harrisburg announced that they will have their inaugural season in 2024.

YOUTH

USA Field Hockey continues to focus on growing affordable and sustainable opportunities, targeting girls and boys ages 5 and up. The USA Field Hockey American Development Model (ADM) establishes values and principles to drive participation and welcome new players (and their parents!) to our great game.

USA Field Hockey continued to expand a library of tools and resources to support individual and organizational leaders of grassroots youth field hockey programs. The “In the Circle” App provides everything leaders need to create turnkey grassroots opportunities. The Equipment Store offers affordable bulk packages containing youth sticks in wood and plastic options, in sizes that fit even the youngest children. The GO Ball, an oversized, light ball, continues to be popular among beginners for both indoor and outdoor play.

Discover Field Hockey Clinic is a turnkey solution for leaders looking to attract young new players. This 90-minute clinic option includes right-sized equipment for all registrants, so hosts can focus on field hockey and not have to worry about registration and equipment.

ADULTS

The United States Field Hockey League (USFHL) Adult Regional and National Club Championship, presented by YOLO Sportswear, is sanctioned by USA Field Hockey and is the annual crowning event of the national adult calendar. For the sixth year, the top adult clubs from every region met for the coveted title of National Champion. The 2023 tournament was held July 21 and 23 at the University of Delaware in Newark, Del. Fans watched 40 games over three days and enjoyed a western-themed social on Saturday night.

Twenty teams, including 12 women’s and 8 men’s, qualified for the event by besting their local leagues or regional championships. Congratulations to the women’s champions, Washington Field Hockey Association, and to the men’s winner, NY Islanders Field Hockey Club.

BOYS & MEN

Although field hockey is enjoyed by men and women equally around the world, boys and men are the minority in field hockey in the United States.

USA Field Hockey is working to grow the male game by partnering with clubs, State Chapters and multi-sport organizations, such as schools and camps, as well as individual leaders across the country with the capacity to provide boys opportunities.

In 2023, USA Field Hockey launched the Boys’ and Men’s (BAM) Newsletter to target communications to male stakeholders.

The Hockey5s has been targeted as a format introducing the sport to boys. Like indoor, the small-sided, exciting format enables outstanding competition that requires less space and fewer players.

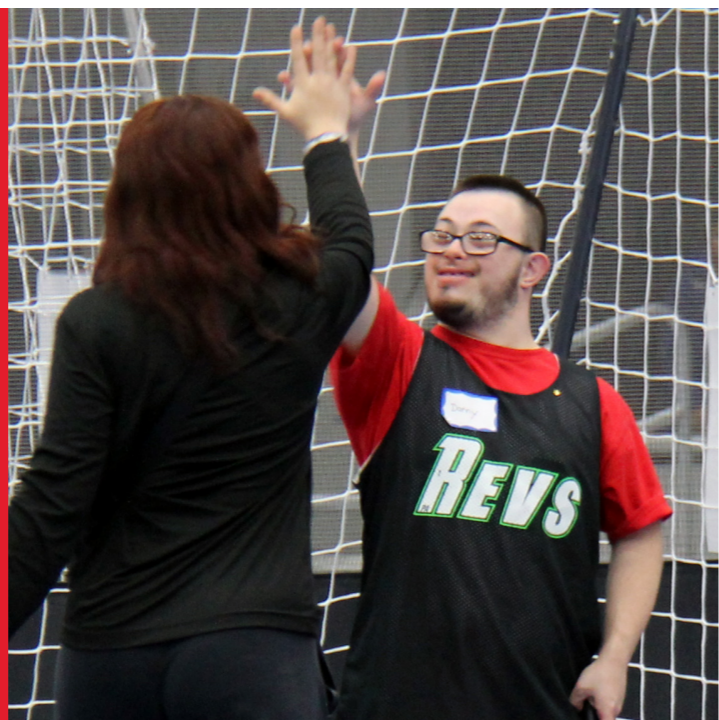
To support the EDI Statement, the Sport Development Department introduced All Starz Field Hockey, USA Field Hockey's disability inclusion program that invites athletes of all abilities to enjoy discovering, playing, learning and competing in field hockey. All Starz Field Hockey was demonstrated in January at the 2022 Sunshine Showcase at ESPN Wide World of Sports at Walt Disney World Resort with the assistance of Long Island Field Hockey.

In November, Walking Hockey was promoted with the inflatable field. Walking Hockey is a modified game of field hockey in which athletes walk instead of run.

USA Field Hockey's goal is to continue to expand the All Starz program here in the United States, ultimately working with the Special Olympics so athletes can represent Team USA in future international Hockey ID events.

2023 USA FIELD HOCKEY ANNUAL AWARD WINNERS

The Annual Awards more broadly recognize, honor and celebrate individuals across the field hockey community whose contributions have made a major and lasting impact on the game of field hockey in the United States. In 2022, five awards were presented in the following categories:



With the Olympic Games returning to Los Angeles in 2028, USA Field Hockey recognized the opportunity and need to grow field hockey and the men's side of the sport for all in and around the region in advance. To achieve this in 2023, USA Field Hockey started investing more resources into Sport Development than ever before, both as a sport for all, sport for life and specifically targeting growth of the game in and around Los Angeles.

USA Field Hockey started to work with partners like the International Hockey Federation, International Olympic Committee, U.S. Olympic and Paralympic Committee and LA28 Committee to set the groundwork for a successful field hockey competition that leaves a legacy in and around Los Angeles and California. This includes advocating for venues that will enable maximum fan engagement to

inspire new viewership and trial, while embracing existing stakeholders.

This also includes partnering with Los Angeles Recreation and Parks, which includes a commitment from both organizations to offer youth field hockey programming to the "melting pot" demographics of millions of children. In 2023, the Sport Development Department worked to deliver more than seven Discover Field Hockey Clinics throughout Los Angeles, and provided Coach Education training to LA Rec and Park professionals who work with children. USA Field Hockey worked directly with the City-Wide Recreation Supervisor to forge a game plan to expand youth field hockey opportunities to include more Discover Field Hockey Clinics, leading to league play, regional championships and tournaments.

USA Field Hockey continued to focus on youth growth through schools in southern California. These programs, which targeted youth in elementary and middle schools, physical education and afterschool groups, continue through partnerships with the Rio and Conejo Valley School Districts. The field hockey unit culminated with a tournament held at Harris Family Field at Moorpark College where almost 400 middle school aged kids played in the 2023 event.

In 2023, Marc Bakerman, USA Field Hockey's Boys Development Manager, will take on additional responsibilities as the Los Angeles Field Hockey Manager.

WEBSITE & SOCIAL COMMUNICATIONS

USA Field Hockey's Communications Department oversees all internal and external communication to members, constituents and stakeholders. The organization's website is the primary focus of communication efforts including news articles, roster announcements, event coverage and more. Secondary are USA Field Hockey's social media platforms. These consist of Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Instagram Stories, LinkedIn, YouTube, Pinterest and Tiktok.

In March 2023, the Communications Department, along with Simon Hoskins, worked with the agency Hats + Rabbits in the preliminary stages of a USA Field Hockey Strategic Positioning and Visual Identity project. When the year closed, the project was along complete with a launch date of March 2024.

In July 2023, the U.S. Olympic and Paralympic Committee (USOPC) launched an new Team USA website along with a Digital Engagement Platform agreement. The organization's website got a complete overhaul and revamp that took hours to complete.

With the Digital Engagement Platform revamped, the USOPC changed the structure of how it was rewarding national governing bodies on the total unique users brought to the website. In 2023, they continued to grant each sport that sits on the Team USA platform the monetary reward in which was achieved in 2021. Since USA Field Hockey reached Tier 1 Status that year with 768,367 total unique users and 2,757,074 pageviews, the organization was awarded the monetary reward.

Unofficially, USA Field Hockey had 940,968 total unique users and 2,361,380 pageviews in 2023.

SOCIAL MEDIA

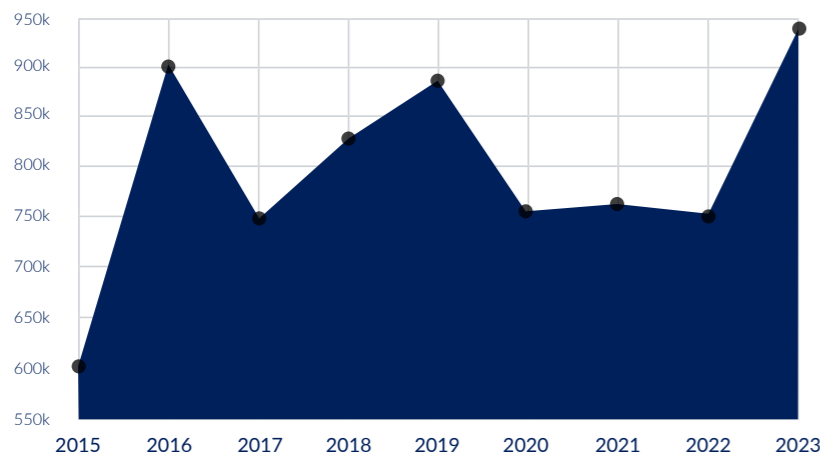
