The ACR publishes highly influential, evidence-based clinical practice guidelines across multiple topics in rheumatology. The ACR is moving toward a living guideline model in which new literature will be reviewed and recommendations updated more frequently to keep guidelines up to date. TEACHING FELLOWS IN LUPUS PROJECT

Each fall, the ACR's Collaborative Initiatives department recruits rheumatology fellowship training programs and FITs to participate in the Teaching Fellows in Lupus Project. Rheumatology FITs facilitate educational sessions for non-rheumatology healthcare providers to help them better recognize the signs and symptoms of lupus and improve timely and accurate referrals to a rheumatologist for diagnosis and treatment. The Winter Rheumatology Symposium (WRS) provides up-to-date, practical clinical information on the diagnosis and management of patients with rheumatic and immune disorders.

Fellows in Training @ State-of-the-Art Clinical Symposium (FIT@SOTA), Spring TBD

This one-day program and excellent networking opportunity provides education on topics of interest to FITs delivered by leaders and experts in the field of rheumatology. Sessions include workshops, panels, lectures, and roundtable discussions.

Rheumatology Research Workshop, Virtual TBD

The Rheumatology Research Workshop (RRW) is an invitation-only, two-day workshop that promotes interaction between rheumatology trainees, early career investigators, and established investigators. RRW includes scientific lectures, oral abstract presentations, and opportunities for early career investigators to interact with senior investigators.

The Virtual Rheumatology Program for Fellows in Training (V-FIT), a collection of online courses developed by rheumatology experts to address the specific educational needs of FITs, includes:

- Virtual Rheumatology Practicum for adult and pediatric rheumatologists (ViP-Adult and ViP-Pediatric)
- Virtual Rheumatology Collaborative (ViRL)
