Meeting Recap
Hillsborough Commission on Human Trafficking
Board Meeting – November 20, 2025

Call to Order: The 11/20/2025 meeting of the COHT was called to order at 1:07pm by Chair Connie Rose.

Quorum was achieved with 15 members present. Member Mogelnicki departed after the presentation. Quorum was maintained with 14 members present for the duration of the meeting.

Recap Review: Motion to approve 7/24/2025 Recap by Member Corrada, seconded by Member Petrilak, motion passed unanimously.

The Chair welcomed attendees, outlined public comment procedures and proceeded with the Recognition of departing COHT Members.

Recognitions: The Chair and Vice Chair honored departing members Gina Dickerson and Beverly Mogelnicki honoring them with certificates and a letter from BOCC Chair Ken Hagan.

Public comment: Allen Teixeira spoke on the Sexual Integrity Project, a trauma-informed recovery program for sex buyers. Christina Bassan shared updates from The FREE Network, emphasizing survivor-led collaboration. Alice Lydia Bird requested a support letter for a \$800,000 state appropriation to fund the CHANCE Program in Hillsborough County.

Guest presentation of the Hillsborough County Health Care Plan by Director Kevin Wagner who gave an overview of the County's program has been running for 34 years and is a no-cost healthcare program designed to support very low-income, uninsured residents, including survivors of human trafficking. It serves approximately 23,000–24,000 individuals annually. Key points are:

The program aims to reduce ER visits by encouraging residents to establish care through primary medical homes. Services include primary and urgent medical and vision care, mental/behavioral health care, substance abuse treatment, prescription medication and oxygen therapy and addresses social determinants of health such as education, food insecurity, and transportation. Additional services include the SOAR Program to assist individuals at risk of homelessness in obtaining SSI/SSDI and a Healthy Living Wellness Program offering personalized wellness care, nutrition classes, and access to exercise equipment at neighborhood service centers.

- Eligibility Criteria: Must be a documented Hillsborough County resident, Must be a U.S. citizen, Income must be below 175% of the federal poverty level, Must not be eligible for other healthcare coverage (e.g., Medicaid, Medicare). Applicants are screened via an online portal, and enrollment can occur in as little as five days.
- Network of Care Includes 30 primary care locations: Suncoast Community Health Centers, Tampa Family Health, BayCare, Tampa General Medical Group, IBIS Health Care (formerly Grace Point and Cove). The program is actively seeking new partners, especially those working with survivors of human trafficking. Outreach teams are available to present the program to partner agencies and community organizations.

Board Discussion: The Chair asked about barriers preventing survivors from accessing the Healthcare plan. Director Wagner responded: Awareness: Many residents are unaware of the program and insurance status, they may already be covered by Medicaid, making them ineligible. Phil Conti (Manager) added that survivors often fly under the radar, making identification and outreach critical. He offered that removing financial barriers to care increases the likelihood of survivors engaging in rehabilitative services. She also asked how organizations can apply for Opioid Settlement Funds and were informed that applications are available via the county website or by contacting either Director Wagner or Manager Conti, or any member of their outreach team. The COHT can assist in disseminating RFAs through its network to reach more organizations.

Guest Presentation – Kenny Bryant, Tampa Housing Authority, discussed their housing programs, mixed-income developments, and human trafficking awareness efforts. Emphasizing the Authority's mission to empower individuals and improve communities, he

noted they offer more than housing—providing services that support residents’ well-being. Established in 1939, the Authority serves families, seniors, and youth across Tampa Bay, managing 5,159 housing units and 10,161 Section 8 vouchers. With a waitlist of 14,700 applicants (as of Dec 2023), they are expanding housing options, including tiny homes and mixed-income models to reduce stigma and improve quality of life. Redevelopment projects include West River: A revitalized community with towers, homes, a Publix, and amenities. Encore District: Senior housing with a musical theme, LEED-certified buildings, and public spaces.

Human trafficking prevention includes staff training, property signage, a dedicated hotline (#2900), wellness checks, and partnerships with law enforcement. Youth programs serve 135 participants annually and include tutoring, sports, and arts. Family and senior services range from career planning and mental health support to cultural and wellness activities.

The Authority promotes education as a tool to break cycles of poverty, emphasizing preventive counseling and alternative career pathways like technical training and military service.

Board Discussion: Members inquired about housing carveouts for survivors. Mr. Bryant confirmed leadership is exploring preferential access for trafficking victims and homeless veterans. He also clarified that case management services are readily available to residents and accessible to non-residents through service centers.

Report from the Chair:

- Discussion of a proposal to organize a BOCC tour of trafficking hotspots and requested volunteers to help plan the tour;
- Media campaign discussion with FKQ about refreshing the “Don’t Buy It, Tampa Bay” campaign and their FY26 Scope of Work was presented. If members approve, once processed by HC Procurement, work will begin in January. They estimated they will achieve 90 million impressions by close of the FY. The refresh includes visual updates, social media presence, and integration with mural artwork.
- Human Trafficking Awareness Month (January) activities may include a press conference, mural unveiling. Coordination with FKQ and Visit Tampa Bay for campaign visibility was requested. The first of the BOCC required semi-annual report presentation will be on January 21, 2026.
- Tampa Mayor Castor Meeting – Member Gray initiated the meeting, inviting Chair Rose and Administrator Montelione to participate. Discussed was enhanced collaboration around human trafficking prevention. Key topics included engaging youth through the Mayor’s Youth Council, supporting trafficked youth via voucher programs, and expanding

community partnerships. Mayor Castor expressed strong support for the “Don’t Buy It, Tampa Bay” campaign and emphasized the importance of unified messaging. Member Corrada suggested outreach to other local mayors should be arranged.

- Children’s Network of Hillsborough County: the Chair received the request and sought COHT Board approval, noting it was reflected in the CNHC representative’s public comment. The Administrator explained that issuing such a letter to a County vendor is unusual. Attorney Cromartie-Mincey will review and revise the letter, with the BOCC to be informed/included in the action.

Motion: by Member Corrada that staff and Hillsborough County Legal look at this letter, make the adjustments necessary, bring it back to you for signature to send out, seconded by Member Petrilak, which passed unanimously.

Motion: by Member Petrilak, seconded by Member, Det. Aguiar to approval engaging FKQ for 2026 media campaign, passed unanimously.

Staff Update:

- A proposed 2026 Calendar was presented.
- Emergency phones: One phone distributed by the Crisis Center; discussion on expanding access to youth and vulnerable populations.
- Membership: TPD’s Sergeant Shriver is expected to return to the board; the HC Hotel Lodging Association seat pending approval by the BOCC.
- Procurement: the Housing Voucher with Support Services RFQ is nearly to be released; scoring committee has been formed.
- Mural Installation: Ongoing Maintenance Agreement discussions continue. Member Klug is working on a solution.

Motion by Member Corrada, seconded by Vice Chair Groover-Skipper to approve the 2026 meeting calendar passed unanimously.

New business: Vice Chair Groover-Skipper announced that the Crisis Center now has NARCAN available for distribution.

Approval to adjourn meeting was requested and approved. The Chair thanked everyone for a great meeting, wishing everyone a Happy Thanksgiving, and holiday season.

Hillsborough County Commission on Human Trafficking (COHT)

Semi-Annual Report January 2026

At the August 20, 2025, Board of County Commissioners Regular Meeting the Board directed staff to work with the Commission on Human Trafficking (COHT) on proposal budget amendments or increases that are justified with data that the Board can review, and the County Administrator can review, as well as allow the COHT to bring the Board semiannual reports. This report is the first of two to be provided to the Board of County Commissioners in 2026.

The Commission on Human Trafficking’s Initiatives and Activities “Strengthening Hillsborough County’s Response To Human Trafficking”

Hillsborough County leads the state of Florida in human trafficking reports. In FY 2023–24, 220 cases were reported, more than any other county in Florida. Over the past reporting period, Hillsborough County law enforcement agencies have conducted several significant operations targeting human trafficking networks. These efforts underscore a strong commitment to dismantling criminal enterprises and safeguarding vulnerable individuals.

Key Operations and Outcomes

- January 2025 – a multi-day operation resulted in 15 individuals arrested; 1 victim rescued. Charges included coercion for commercial sex acts and transportation for prostitution. Victim received housing assistance through Selah Freedom.
- March 2025 - a follow-up investigation was conducted with additional charges filed against previously arrested suspect; victim rescued after enduring coercion and violence. COHT member organization, Selah Freedom, assisted with recovery services.
- June 2025 - Operation Dragon Eye was a two-week, multi-agency initiative led by the U.S. Marshals Service (Middle District of Florida) in partnership with 20 agencies, including federal, state, and local law enforcement, social service entities, and Non-Governmental Organizations (NCOs). It is considered the most successful missing child recovery operation in U.S. history with 60 critically missing children recovered (ages 9–17) from Hillsborough, Pinellas, and Pasco counties. Several COHT member organizations participated by providing rescued children with medical evaluations and trauma-informed psychological care. Housing and long-term recovery plans were created in collaboration with COHT member organization Redefining Refuge. Eight suspects were arrested. Several rescued children were pregnant, one carrying the child of a trafficker.
- October 2025 – “Operation Unmasking Predators” during Halloween week, 171 arrests in undercover sting targeting child exploitation and trafficking. Detectives posed online as minors and traffickers, intercepting suspects arranging to purchase sex with children. Several COHT member organizations assisted with recovery services.

Local Impact Metrics – The University of South Florida established the TIP Lab and BRIGHT Project with initial startup funding from the Board of County Commissioners upon recommendation from the COHT. Their 2024 Annual Report cites that Hillsborough County has identified 27 human trafficking locations, second in the state behind Miami/Dade county. BRIGHT data as of July 2025 COHT reports in Hillsborough County there were:

- Arrests: 81 between 2021 - 2024
- Prosecutions: 25
- Commercial Sex Ads: 19,591
- Illicit Massage Businesses: 44
- Verified Child Victims: 5

Summary: These operations reflect a multi-agency approach combining undercover stings, digital forensics, and victim support services. Partnerships with nonprofits have been critical in providing housing and recovery assistance to rescued individuals. All these operations combined underscore the magnitude of the crisis and the critical need for investments in providing services, engaging in public awareness campaigns and funding emergency housing. It should be noted that the COHT's Vice Chair holds two important board positions. She serves as a member of the USF BRIGHT Advisory Council, and is a Florida State Massage Board member, a Governor DeSantis appointed position. The Massage Board is responsible for disciplinary cases, application review, liaison reports, rule discussions and other necessary Board actions.

Survivor Support

The COHT continues to provide support for the victims/survivors of these operations and for law enforcements efforts to rescue them. Working countywide, the COHT brings together NGOs with law enforcement and the judicial system to discuss their greatest needs and reduce redundancy, effectuating efficiencies across all sectors.

Legal Training Initiative:

August 2025 - the COHT hosted a specialized legal training event at the Pat Frank Court Building to strengthen the prosecution of human trafficking cases and enhance victim support. The program, developed in partnership with the Bureau of Justice Assistance and the National Training and Technical Assistance Center, provided attorneys, paralegals, and court services personnel with practical strategies for identifying trafficking indicators, applying trauma-informed practices, and improving case documentation. Offered free of charge and approved for CLE credits, the training was attended by 77 participants across two sessions, reinforcing the Commission's commitment to building a more informed and responsive legal system for survivors. There was no cost to the County with support from Visit Tampa Bay, the State Attorney's office, the State of Florida's Office of the Attorney General and the Federal Department of Justice.

Prevention Programing

The COHT works in tandem with the Hillsborough County School District's "Save Our Students (SOS)" efforts to ensure Hillsborough County builds a stronger prevention, protection, and placement system to safeguard its children and disrupt trafficking at its roots. The COHT continues to strengthen partnerships across agencies with participation in various efforts including the SOS. According to publicly reported Florida Department of Education data, Hillsborough County's students are provided some form of human trafficking awareness education from 6th through 12th Grade. COHT members participate in town hall style meetings across the County at school board-initiated information sessions for parents.

Specialized Foster Training and Survivor Care:

The protection and prevention of human trafficking of at-risk children is a priority for the COHT and had recommended BOCC approved-funding to Hillsborough County's state designated agency, the Children's Network of Hillsborough County (CNHC). This funding specifically assisted foster families and trafficked or at-risk youth. The Children's Services Department worked with Government Relations and Strategic Services staff to bring the pilot program (funded in FY 25) to increase the number of trauma-informed foster homes; enhance available survivor wraparound services, and train seasoned foster parents to take in trafficked youth or those exposed to trafficking, while delivering trauma-informed survivor care, mentoring, and recovery support. Both were key elements to stabilizing youth after Dragon Eye.

Impact: The program expanded safe, stable family placements ensuring survivors receive immediate, specialized care that reduces recidivism and runaway risk. The program included training and a targeted awareness campaign specifically to help the county and the community in understanding that human trafficking does exist and is prevalent within our foster care systems. These funds will support stabilizing these youths as well as helping to educate the community as to how they can better engage and assist these youth.

Anti-Trafficking Community Education/Awareness

As part of its ongoing efforts to raise awareness and combat human trafficking, the COHT launched a comprehensive media campaign during FY 25 that delivered exceptional results. The "Don't Buy It Tampa Bay" Campaign generates awareness to residents and visitors to Tampa Bay on how to recognize the indicators and learn to report suspected activity. The campaign's messaging emphasized diversity among victims, storytelling beyond signs, and clear reporting instructions. The campaign combines proven media reach with survivor-centered design, directly addressing the root driver of trafficking demand while positioning Hillsborough County as a model for prevention statewide.

Campaign Impact Total Impressions: 167.8 million (57% above the 106M estimate).

Hillsborough County Commission on Human Trafficking (COHT) Semi-Annual Report January 2026

- Multi-Channel Outreach included partnerships with television stations WFLA-TV and WTTA-TV featuring spokesperson Titus O’Neil; on radio with 1,125 bonus spots across six stations, including Spanish-language programming.
- Out-of-home placements included:
 - interstate highway billboards and digital bulletins (34.7M impressions)
 - Targeted billboards in East Tampa, Plant City, and Wimauma (54M impressions),
 - Transit (HART bus ads: 23.3M impressions)
 - Tampa International Airport digital signage: 27.9M impressions
 - Print & rideshare included free placements in *Tampa Bay Times* print and digital editions (585K impressions), Uber/Lyft car wraps (15.4M impressions) and City Kiosks (Street-level messaging in downtown Tampa: 3.8M impressions).

Community Impact

This campaign reinforced Tampa Bay’s commitment to combating human trafficking through sustained, geo-targeted awareness and strategic partnerships with local media and venues.

Protecting Survivors

January 2026 - Addressing the safety of survivors upon identification and at the request of law enforcement, RFQ-26-00076 has been publicly posted. Emergency Housing with Support Services funding will provide immediate accommodation for survivors with case management, counseling and support services. Responses are expected to provide one of the first programs of its kind unique to Hillsborough County and will increase the success of prosecution of traffickers and begin a new journey for survivors.
