
Community Investment Tax (CIT): Your Half-Cent Sales Tax at Work



The Community Investment Tax (CIT) was established to fund capital improvement projects and equipment in Hillsborough County, the cities of Tampa, Temple Terrace, Plant City, and Hillsborough County Public Schools. It is a half-cent sales tax that was approved by voters in September 1996 for 30 years. It expires on Nov. 30, 2026.

Community Investment Tax (CIT) (Local Government Infrastructure Surtax) Renewal

A renewed half-cent sales tax would continue as part of the current 7.5% sales tax paid by residents and visitors to Hillsborough County. Hillsborough County Public Schools would receive 5% of total CIT revenue. The remaining revenue would be distributed to Hillsborough County and the three cities per the population-based State-Shared Half-Cent Sales Tax Formula as illustrated in the CIT Revenue Breakdown chart.



CIT Accomplishments, 1996-Present

Since 1996, the CIT has provided about \$2.3 billion to fund or partially fund 757 capital improvement projects.

including 22nd St. Main Street Community Project, Bell Shoals Rd. Widening

258 parks and recreation projects

projects including All People's Community Park & Life Center, Lutz Little League, Veterans Memorial Park

including Tampa Police Department District III Headquarters, Falkenburg Road Jail Expansion, Hillsborough County Court Complex

including Balm Riverview at Boyette Rd., Citrus Park Dr., Lithia Pinecrest/ Lumsden Rd./Bell Shoals Rd./Durant Rd.

32 bridge projects

including Columbus Dr. at Hillsborough River, Memorial Hwy. over Dick Creek, Platt St. at Hillsborough River

126 stormwater projects

including Culvert Replacement Program, Duck Pond drainage improvements, major neighborhood drainage improvements

42 public utilities projects

including Carrollwood Water Franchise Acquisition, Causeway Boulevard Water/Sewer Main (Palm River area), Wimauma Water System – potable water mains

6 new or expanded libraries

including Lutz, Thonotosassa, West Tampa. SouthShore

projects including Brandon Regional Service Center, Children's Services Athletic Center, Raymond James Stadium

12 arts and culture projects

including MOSI, Tampa Bay History Center, ZooTampa at Lowry Park

Proposed CIT Projects, 2026-2041

Renewal of the CIT for 15 years starting in 2026 would generate an estimated \$3,764,347,815 to be used for:



New streets, sidewalks, and paths. Existing infrastructure will be maintained and repaired. Roadway congestion relief will also be a priority.

• Transportation/Roads: Bridge repairs and replacements, intersection safety and mobility, traffic signals replacements and upgrades, congestion relief on both Lithia Pinecrest Rd. and Van Dyke Rd., repairing and pavement preservation, sidewalk repairs



Public facilities projects to provide recreational, entertainment, and learning experiences.

- Government Facilities and Equipment: Community Facilities including community centers, new Pet Resource Center, tournament sports facilities, Amalie Arena and Raymond James Stadium capital maintenance/repair
- Libraries, Parks and Recreation: Library improvements, multi-use trails and boardwalks; new park construction, playground equipment, synthetic turf fields, covered basketball courts
- Schools: Elementary school and middle school in Wimauma, elementary school near Apollo Beach



Public safety projects to support fire rescue, law enforcement, and the court system's public safety functions.

- Courts: Courthouse expansion including land acquisition, courtroom expansions, new downtown courthouse
- Fire Services: New fire stations, equipment, and vehicles
- Law Enforcement: Equipment and facilities; Sheriff's Office jail expansion and improvements, vehicles, equipment



Stormwater and drainage improvements, and septic-to-sewer conversions to increase capacity and reliability.

• Stormwater: Septic-to-sewer conversions; stormwater infrastructure
